Yesterday was the deadline for submissions to host the 2013 Nova Scotia 55+ Games. Illegal Dumps Endangered

Recently the Municipality

ing an increased number of calls from area residents reporting illegal dumps in

West Colchester. As of press time it is not known if dumping is becoming more preva-

becoming more concerned.

However, it is very clear the municipality is placing illegal dumps on the endangered list, and will aggressive pursue convictions and cleanup.

In speaking with officials from the municipality's waste management group, they advised me that as soon as they receive a call, the enforcement officer is directed to visit the scene and start an investigation. IN his column on Page 5 of this issue, District 10 councillor, Tom Taggart, is adamant he will press for full force of the law to achieve convictions for illegal dumping.

The Shoreline Journal has received several pictures of an illegal dumpsite on Lornevale Road, Great Village. (See photos elsewhere in this issue). Another site has been located in the Bass River area and the media have been

Clear Bags start September 1; Enforcement January 1

The 51,000 residents of Colchester County in the Towns of Truro and Stewiacke and the Municipality of Colchester will be joining the other 33 Municipalities in Nova Scotia to choose clear bags for their garbage disposal. The decision to go clear was an easy one for Councils once the privacy concerns of their residents was addressed by allowing one garbage bag per collection that could not be seen through. Clear bags for garbage will be for everyone businesses, schools, apartments and institutions.

Public education sessions will be held in September and by request during the months of May to August. Contact 895-4777 to schedule one for your worksite. The clear bag program becomes effective on September 1 and education will continue throughout the year. On January 1, 2012 enforcement will begin where the non-clear bags (exception privacy bag) will not be collected or accepted for disposal at the Colchester Balefill Facility.

Residents in Colchester have been doing a great job

in recycling and composting.

The clear bag program will encourage those that need to do a better job of coming into compliance with the 1996 Provincial Disposal Ban Regulations.

The clear bag for garbage programs across Province have reduced garbage disposal on average about 30%. This garbage reduction will have direct benefits to the people of Colchester, by saving valuable and expensive landfill space, lowering green house gas production, and processing more recyclable resources
