Bill Wheaton hasn't been out for a round of golf yet this Spring but he has been on the putting green a couple of times.

The avid golfer, who was born in Parrsboro on Dec. 6, 1920 said he gets down to the golf course every morning for a coffee and is looking forward to hitting the fairway again.

Bill is the son of Walter

and Lottie (Elliott) and he grew up in the town, helping out at his aunt's ice parlor when he was younger.

Bill got into the Air Force in 1941. "I tried to enlist 10 days after the war broke out but they kept putting me off." He said he wanted to be a member of the air crew but ws told to enlist as an air frame technician and then remuster to air crew but he never got to make the move.

While posted in New Brunswick, Bill said he "married the best looking girl in Moncton, Irene Breau." After leaving the Air Force in 1945, Bill and Irene returned to Parrsboro where he took over his parents' restaurant and confectionary business.

"I'm the candy man," Bill said. He used to make all manner of candy, including the old-fashioned ribbon candy and barley toys.

The business burnt down in 1962 because of kids playing with fire crackers, Bill

said. He ran a small lunch counter for a spell but they decided to move to the United States. The original plan was to move to Connecticut but "I said to Irene, they have snow in Connecticut so we're going to keep on going. We ended up in Lake Worth, Florida."

After spending about five years in the States, they returned to Parrsboro where Bill ended up as a manufacturer's agent for a Montrealbased firm. He travelled throughout the Atlantic provinces as well as the U.S. and overseas.

The couple had two children, Brenda who died in infancy, and Billy, who is the greens keeper at the local golf course."And a very good golfer, to boot," Bill said with a laugh. He added he was really looking forward to getting out on the course with his grandsons Ryan and Patrick.

Bill Grant started singing in the church choir when he

was a teenager and he stills get out now and then to lend his voice to the group.

"Mom (Vola (Morris) of Advocate) and dad did a lot of community work and were both very active in the church," explained their only child daughter Patricia

Bill was born May 28, 1917 in Apple River, the son of Wellington and Utah (Milton) Grant. He spent his early years in Apple River but then the family moved to Spencer's Island, which is on the Parrsboro side of Advocate. He finished his schooling in Spencer's Island

University, Horton Academy. He served as a radar operator during the Second World War, leaving the army in 1945 with the rank of Sergeant.

He continued to run the store with other family members until 1974 when he joined Canada Post. Bill retired from Canada Post in 1982 and has kept busy helping out in the community ever since.


