a writer/photographer and filmmaker who lives in the Annapolis Valley and has a studio in Halifax, interviewed most of the seniors in their own homes. She says she tried to keep the conversation casual, more like a conversation between friends. "This has been one of the most inspiring learning experiences of my life," she told those gathered at the reception in the Legion Hall saying, "I am really grateful to you." Nance says she learned so many new things like how the tide works in the bay, all about a log drive and even how to make raw potato hash but more importantly she learned "at the age of 98, 91 or 95 life is still very full". She feels it is vital to other generations to have these stories written down and read.

Eleven of the 16 elders were present at the Celebration. Hazel Hill's story is featured on page 52 and 53, and her photo is on the front cover, as well as on page 51. She says she was a bit hesitant to participate in the beginning, "I was embarrassed at first but Nance was a great help with ideas. After a while, I found I really enjoyed it and now I think the book is wonderful. I guess I thought present day people wouldn't enjoy reading these stories and it would be more for future generations." Hazel says she wishes she had asked more questions of her own father while he was alive.

Logan Spencer and Bertha MacRae read excerpts from their writings during the program, with Florence Adams reading one of her lovely poems, as well.

"Telling Our Stories" is 61 pages in length, contains a beautiful portrait of each author along with their story and a favorite recipe. The publication is a Senior's Literacy project, created by The Colchester Adult Learning Association (CALA) and the Great Village Community Association, to enhance the literacy and learning skills of older Nova Scotians. The project was designed to focus on storytelling, creative writing and reading skills of seniors.

The book was presented in draft form at the April celebration; the final printing will be offered for sale at \$15 per copy and can be ordered from the Great Village Community Association.
