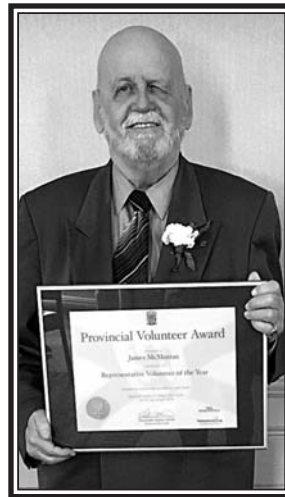
## Volunteer of the Year

## Velsoft Gets Payroll Rebate

Nova Scotia Business Inc. (NSBI) has approved a business development incentive in the form of a payroll rebate for Velsoft Training Materials Inc., based in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia. Velsoft, a fully-integrated e-learning

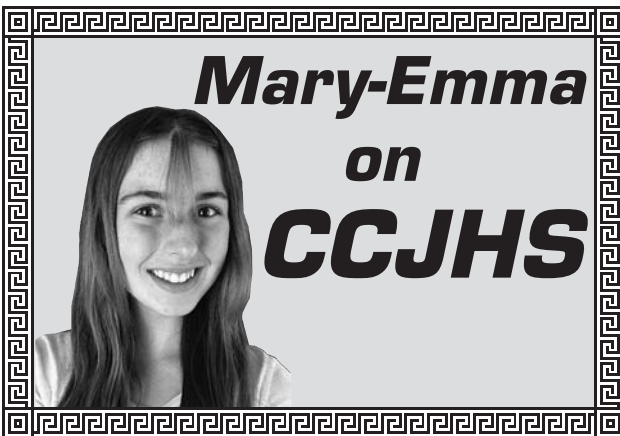
company, has the potential to create up to a maximum of 30 new jobs related to the expansion of its virtual campus opportunities and line of business. Based on the maximum growth forecast of the agreement, NSBI estimates the company could spend \$4,500,000 in salaries.

It is also estimated the new employees would contribute provincial tax revenues of \$480,000 through their income and consumption taxes. As a result, the company would earn a rebate up to \$315,000 over five years.

Velsoft Training Materials Inc. would be eligible for a smaller rebate if it creates fewer than 30 new jobs.

### Fire Departments can apply until June 22<sup>nd</sup>

The Emergency Services Provider Fund, which offers financial assistance to volunteer fire departments and ground search and rescue organizations, including those that handle hazardous materials, to upgrade equipment that is used in response to a fire or emergency is receiving applications until June 22. The program provides up to 75 per cent of eligible costs to a maximum of \$20,000. Organizations can only receive funding once every three years. ### Motor Vehicle Act to be replaced

Residents have an opportunity to provide feedback to the government's plan to replace the Motor Vehicle Act with a new Traffic Safety Act. One of the first areas being updated are rules of the road, including distracted driving, speed limits and bicycling. The new act, expected to be introduced in the Nova Scotia legislature this fall, governs and regulates the registration and identification of motor vehicles and the use of provincial highways and roads. This includes driver's licenses, the registration and inspection of vehicles, traffic laws and equipment standards.
