



Portapique Community Project Moving Ahead

Covid-19 has delayed not derailed renovation progress at the Portapique Community Hall. Some of the "Get Things Done Days" when volunteers would carry out various renovations and property improvements have had to be cancelled to abide by health protocols.

Contingent on health regulations in place at the time, the next work day is tentatively scheduled for June 13th. If volunteers wish to sign up to assist, they should contact a project coordinator at: portapiquehall@gmail.com

Andrew MacDonald, one of the Rotary Club co-chairs, told the Shoreline the project continues to move ahead. Construction of the playground by Cobequid Consulting is well underway. Completion originally scheduled for May 2021 has been pushed ahead to June 2021. The planning committee is currently working on completion of detailed drawings, and will be going to tender later this summer.

Construction of the new additional is still expected to reach the stage, the building can be "closed-in" by November. Construction costs are expected to be higher than original estimates, because the interest from various groups wishing to used the facilities required construction of an additional 500 sq ft.

Groups identified, to date, expressing interest in the facility include: MacPhee Centre for Creative Learning (\$57k

project); NS Remembers Legacy Society - Community and Education; BBBS Children's Programs; Fundy Shore Community Health Board and Fundy GeoPark (UNESCO site).

The MacPhee Centre for Creative Learning are still planning on hosting four weeklong camps for children this summer. In order to acquire instruments and other necessary supplied, the centre embarked on a \$57,000 fund raising cam-

paign. Officials say fundraising has been proceeding on schedule and they have reached approximately 80% of their goal.

Once they are able to go to tender, the next moves will be to relocate the existing building on a new foundation and construct the addition. The Portapique Community Build-Up+ project is expected to cost in excess of \$800,000 upon completion.

Ulnooweg Develop Group (Ulnooweg), located in Millbrook, Nova Scotia, and with offices in New Brunswick and in Newfoundland and Labrador, is one of a few Indigenous business support organizations helping Indigenous businesses reach their goals.

A recent contribution from the Regional Relief and Recovery Fund (RRRF), delivered by ACOA, enabled Ulnooweg to help 23 Indigenous clients access the entrepreneurial training and digital support they needed to serve their own clients virtually and safely, in compliance with pandemic restrictions.

A second component of the project supported technology upgrades to Ulnooweg's office systems, allowing the organization to better respond to clients' needs in a virtual environment, while enabling staff to work securely and remotely from home.

With support from ACOA, Ulnooweg has hosted and organized the Ulnooweg Entrepreneur Award Show every other year since 2005. The event, which acknowledges


