## Mayor Christine Blair Promotes Colchester

*The following are highlights of County of Colchester Mayor Christine Blair's remarks at the Truro & Colchester Chamber of Commerce's sponsored Mayor and Chief Breakfast held May 19th at Inn on Prince.*

### Highlights of Mayor Blair's presentation:

Good morning, everyone. It's a pleasure to be here and especially in-person.

Council recently completed its operating budget with no increases to the residential or commercial tax rates. This is the fourth year of the last five that we have been able to accomplish this, with just a half cent increase in 2019.

44% of our budget is determined and charged to us by the province for services such as education our biggest provincial bill at \$8.2 million - corrections, libraries, and policing.

The cost of policing alone went up 11.4% this year - \$580,000.

In the past several months council reviewed and renewed its strategic priorities. Policing was identified as our #1 priority.

In 2020 an external consultant with extensive expertise in policing was hired to serve as a technical advisor to council. A survey of council was also completed to identify policing priorities.

The RCMP have since been advised of these priorities and the results of the consultant's report.

Debert business park remains a priority. In recent years we have completed new branding, have 14 new businesses, 7 business expansions with new



to investigate development partnerships and confirm the preferred project delivery approach.

We continue to work with the TCPEP to recruit physicians.

We partner with the Towns of Truro and Stewiacke, and Millbrook First Nation, along with the Chamber with the Truro Colchester Economic Partnership for Prosperity (TCPEP) to advance economic development in our region.

Most recently, as a region, we have collaborated on an accessibility plan for all of Colchester County. The plan will guide us on how to make our municipalities more accessible to all residents.

In addition, our Municipality has formed an equity, diversity, and inclusion committee. The committee will first focus on how we can improve our organization internally before advancing to more community related initiatives.

Public consultation is underway for the future use of the former Salmon River Elementary School property. Three concepts are being considered for the future use of this land.

Tatamagouche Development Plan will soon be completed. In the near future a similar planning process will be undertaken for the entire municipality as the province will require all municipalities to have complete planning strategies and land use bylaws in place.

Hart Haven Memorial Park is a project initiated in Debert by the community and families of two victims of the mass shooting. The municipality offered land within the business

## Mayor Bill Mills Promotes the Town of Truro

### Highlights of Mayor Mills' presentation:

**Regional Viewpoint Approach** - TIDS regional viewpoint contract began on April 10, 2019 through the Truro Colchester Partnership for Economic Prosperity this has an annual cost to the town of \$6,000 and has been renewed on an annual

basis. TIDS was previously paying \$12,000 per year for one viewpoint contract.

**Business Park Master Plan** - The majority of 2021 was used as a planning year to develop plan for future growth through the Business Park Master Plan Project through assistance from Fowler Bauld & Mitchell (FBL), Englobe and Colliers International. TIDS completed a Master Plan for expansion of the Truro Business Park. The final Master Plan report considers several factors in its recommendations, including stakeholder feedback, geographical and topographical challenges, marketability of future lands, municipal servicing, street networks and road design, land use planning and overall development and infrastructure costs.

**Land Sales:** Lots 6A, 7A and 8A (733 Young Street), sold 7.73 acres to AIM Recycling in December 2020 for \$170,000. As a result a building permit for \$1,150,000 was issued for construction of a 25,000 sq ft warehouse for metal recycling facility.

Town officials and staff are working with everyone on the TAAC \$8-Million upgrade and expansion. The town has committed \$500,000 toward the project.

**No 2 Construction Battalion National Apology Event** - Town staff have been working with the Canadian Armed Forces to organize the No 2 Construction Battalion National Apology Event. The event is taking place on July 9th at the TAAC grounds will include a march followed by a ceremony and a gun salute.

**Deer Hunt** - The town has been working collaboratively with Department of Natural Resources and Renewables for the last few years and continues to do. Department of Natural Resources has jurisdiction over wildlife in the province. The department required extensive concrete data to work from before any action could be taken. Over the last four years the town has collected extensive data to determine

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is a \$61.1 million dollar project, which will have capacity to serve 24,400 civic addresses.

The second project is the Cliffs of Fundy UNESCO Global Geopark. The Gopark spans from the Fundy Discovery.
