Even though it's been a nice spring with a warm day or two, then back to colder weather and threatening snow flurries. Actually, I am waiting for warmer weather, but that will also be the start of black fly season. If we wish to head into the kitchen its time to think of a recipe. With Mother's Day held a couple weeks ago, I've come across a special recipe, which for lack of a better name, I will call "My Mother's Favourite". It's simple to make, throw it in the oven and it's a complete meal.

"My Mother's Favourite"

(Problem with this recipe, I don't have quantities. With your years of experience knowing your family's love of food, I'm sure you will adjust accordingly. Primarily depends on how many sausage links, or how much I want to make)

Potatoes - peel and slice as if scalloped potatoes
Large Onion - (maybe two) - peel and slice like potatoes
Italian or hot sausage - (at least a pound - more if you wish) - slice like a tooney - ¼" maybe bit thicker
28 oz Canned Tomatoes (More tomatoes if very large casserole)
5 oz can tomato paste or 14 oz can tomato sauce
Tomato Juice - top up to cover
Seasoning - salt and pepper, plus your favourite.

Put all in your casserole or baking dish, except tomato juice. Stir until all mixed up and tomatoes are crushed, if you chose whole tomatoes. Add tomato juice to cover.

Cover casserole, place in 350 oven. Cook until potatoes are softened or cooked the way you like. Under cook potatoes a bit, if you are going for leftovers or freeze.

(Make an extra large casserole to ensure enough left to put in the freezer for another easy to prepare meal).

Whether you're attached to a primary care provider or not, access has been a challenge for too many. Over the past decade not enough was done to recruit for doctor retirements or plan for population growth.

Many Nova Scotians are attached to a family care provider but can't easily get an appointment. Others have access through virtual care, primary care clinics, mobile clinics or at their local pharmacy - but may want to be attached to a consistent provider who can follow their care.

Our government is working to improve both access and attachment so Nova Scotians get the care they need the way they want to receive it.

Recently we announced plans for more than 60 new and

Health Committee Update

I continue to represent our constituency as Vice-Chair of Parliament's Standing Committee on Health (HESA). Meetings are held Tuesdays and Thursdays. The issues are many and all are important. For example, in April and May, the committee heard presentations regarding potential health dangers created by breast implants. HESA also received testaments about patented medicines costs and availability.

As HESA's Vice-Chair, I also had the opportunity to question Health Minister Jean-Yves Duclos, at length, regarding influenza vaccine stockpiles. As it turns out, Canada does not have any serum stored in preparation for the next onslaught.

strengthened clinics, including collaborative family practice teams, primary care clinics and urgent treatment centres across the province.

What does that mean for you?

As clinics open, patients who might have had to go to an emergency department or wait weeks to see a provider will get better care, faster.

Expanding options and team-based clinics will help get Nova Scotians off the Need a Family Practice Registry and boost options for same-day/next-day appointments. It will also mean more healthcare providers will get the support they need.

This is just one of many actions we're taking to improve primary care.

On the first of May the Province and the Federal Government announced \$18 million in Mental Health funding for Cumberland, Colchester and East Hants over 2 years in response to the Mass Casualty Commission report. Should you wish to speak with or be put in touch with any mental health services, regardless of the severity or cause you can call 1-888 429 5167 24 hours a day or you can call my office 902-641-2335 for a confidential referral.

My office has direct contacts within the NS Health system and we will have them help you navigate the system and find the service you wish. The Departments of Mental Health and Dept of Health have offered clinics in Bass River, Masstown, Wentworth and East Hants over the past 2 weeks. Admittedly they were some-

"We're pleased to help the co-op council buy these rental properties so that the residents can continue to live in a place they know and where they can access the community supports and services they may need," said Municipal Affairs and Housing Minister John Lohr. "This is great news for the community and for those people living in these units."

Through the Community Housing Acquisition Program, the government provided the council a \$1.7-million low-interest mortgage to purchase the property.
