The Truro and District Chamber of Commerce has expressed it pleasure with the February 18th announcement the Nova Scotia Government has committed another \$25 million towards a new Colchester Regional Hospital. The price tag on the facility has jumped from \$104 million to \$185 million over the course of five years. Local businesses and residents are committed to raising \$26 million for the new complex.

Two hospitality projects with a combined value of more than \$30 million are in the advanced planning stages for the Truro Power Centre Millbrook Mi'kmaq First Nation Chief Lawrence Paul and Glenn Squires, CEO of Pacrim Hospitality Services Inc (PHSI) announced on February 18th. The two, partners in both projects, said planning for a 150 seat new concept restaurant/retail facility and a major destination attraction—a 30,000 sg ft indoor water park and 100 room hotel at the Truro site are well-advanced and will be signature additions to the provincial hospitality industry.

Millbrook First Nation, Chief Lawrence Paul has announced a project that will preserve and protect the Mi'kmaq language."We are committed to preserving restoring fluency and literacy in the Mi'kmaq language, it is apart of our province's history that needs to be revitalized and preserved for future generations." Said Lloyd Johnson, Chairman of the Glooscap Heritage Society. The Glooscap Heritage Centre has recently purchased 3 units of a new technology called the "Phraselator". With this cutting edge translating technology, the GHC will be able to preserve the many nuances of the Mi'kmaq language as spoken by the Elders in various Mi'kmaq communities in Nova Scotia. The GHC also hopes to form a permanent Department of Language within their centre. By involving Elders from around the province, the GHC hopes to capture every distinct aspect of the Mi'kmaq language. As the first Mi'kmaq cultural preservation center to acquire this new technology in Atlantic Canada, the GHC is now at the forefront of language preservation and education. With the aid of the Phraselators, the GHC will upload the entire Mi'kmaq language database to their new website and increase awareness of the many different nuances the Mi'kmaq language has and how it is spoken.

Matthew Pryde, who has been a regular contributor to the Shoreline has accepted a new position as the Physical Activity Specialist with the Aboriginal Diabetes Initiative in the Atlantic Region, effective March 8th.

The Thirsty Church in Londonderry is overflowing with acts of kindness, thanks to many community businesses and volunteers.

Amanda Langille entered the Londonderry Station Community Church into the Aviva Community Fund Contest last fall, in hopes of getting a well installed. The title of "Thirsty Church" had garnered a huge amount of attention and support but the winners were

announced, on Sunday, January 24th, the Church had not been awarded any funding.

"We were certainly disappointed when we heard the results of the contest," said Amanda. "Our disappointment changed in a hurry when we received the call from Greg Johnson on Tuesday, Jan.

Greg Johnson, owner of Hub Well Drilling, had been contacted back in November to give an estimate of costs involved in getting water hooked up at the Church. He says he was quite amazed the Church had never had water and thought for sure they would win.

"When I heard they hadn't won the contest I immediately knew I wanted to make sure the Church got their well. I thought they must be feeling quite disappointed, after working so hard on the project, and I wanted to cheer them up a bit, while the project still had momentum," says Greg.

Hub Well Drilling was at Londonderry Station Community Church by Wednesday, Jan. 27th. After drilling 140 feet and installing 46 feet of casing the first stage in getting water flowing at the Thirsty Church was complete.

Greg Johnson and his two sons, Brian and Mitchell, were pleased to be able to help. "We do a lot of work in this area and it is nice to be able to give something back and help the community out," said Brian Brian and Mitchell were

back the next day to run the water line into the Church and hook up the pump.

Amanda Langille says what Greg did acted as a catalyst for any many more good deeds.

Randy Culgin, owner of Culgin Contruction in Belmont, was at the Church on Thursday, Jan 28th donating his excavator to dig and backfill the 5 foot trench from the well to the Church, while inside, George Hudson, of Great Village, was voluntarily hooking up the electrical work needed for the pump. George said he had done some work at the Church in the past and he was pleased to help out again.

Amanda is overjoyed that offers to help the Thirsty Church continue to pour in. Daryl Deuville, a carpenter from Salmon River has offered his labor. Richard Lane will donate labor for construction and to help draw up a floor plan. Jane Upham of VROD is donating free internet service. Earl Casey, of Casey Concrete, has offered a septic tank.
