#### Narrow escape at Parrsboro Arena

Snow sliding off the roof of the Parrsboro Lions Arena buried three vehicles at 2:30 pm Saturday afternoon, February 19th.Two 11-12 year old members of the Antigonish Bulldogs Pee Wee female hockey team had just gotten into the back seat one of the vehicles.

Cumberland District RCMP Const. Dal Hutchinson said, approximately 30 volunteers had to shovel a space around the car allowing them to open a door enough to let the girls escape. All three cars had smashed windshields and damage to their hoods and roofs. When the packed snow settled, it was above the side-window level of the vehicles.

A farmer arrived with his tractor to help remove the snow. After freeing the girls, volunteers spent an hour shovelling along the building to make sure no one else was under the snow. More heavy wet snow fell off the roof, while volunteers were shovelling, but no one was injured. Barricades were erected to prevent vehicles from parking next to the building as snow still remained on the roof.

The girls were taken to hospital for treatment of a cut hand and toe injuries before being released.

## **Debert now accepting International Flights**

Debert Airport is going international. A new Canpass system is now available for pre-approved flights coming into the airport from international destinations, including the United States. As a result, a newlyapproved CanPass building is located on site at Debert.

"CanPass means that travellers outside of our borders pre-register with Canada Customs, and can gain access to the Debert airport's runway and fueling facilities without a formal face to face meeting with a Canada Customs officer," says CoRDA's Debert Airport Supervisor Tony Richards. "When pilots use CanPass, Canada Customs looks at

who's on the flight and what they're carrying, usually a day or two in advance."

Canada Customs officials will come out from the Halifax-Stanfield Airport to greet exactly who is on the flight, and physically examine what kind of cargo they're carrying should there be any concerns.

"It opens up the Debert Airport to a whole new range of clients," says CoRDA's Executive Director Ron Smith. "We're here to make business flow more smoothly, and that's what this important step does for the Debert Airport. We are a convenient re-fuelling stop for regional flights, and for flights between Canada and






Debert Airport has runway lengths up to 5000 feet with Class "A" jet fuel is available on site. The airport offers daytime winter runway maintenance and when there is no snow
