Just days before the show in Halifax, Rebecca also participated in the Canadian Gift and Tableware Association trade show in Toronto, sponsored by the Craft Alliance with funding from the Ministry of Communities, Culture & Heritage. She took orders from more than 30 store owners from across the country. Since last fall, they've tripled the number of retails outlets. "It's pretty exciting to know that our products will be sold all across Canada now," she says. "We've even got some orders for a couple of boutiques down in Florida."

"Nova Scotia is a great place to start and grow a business," says Taylor. "From our regional development agency, to the Nova Scotia Designer Craft Council, and Nova Scotia Business Inc., the encouragement and resources that are available make it easier to succeed."

With the business growing so fast, Rebecca realizes that she will have to expand into larger premises later this year and staff will be added as the business continues to grow. She's excited about providing employment for local residents.
