# **Generous Donation to Fight Child Hunger**

students in a little country school have big hearts and thanks to their efforts seven families on the far side of the globe will receive their support.

Mrs. Totten's class at Great Village Elementary was studying children's rights in Social Studies. They were reviewing United Declaration of the Rights of The Child, which includes 10 principles and students were asked to list their top three choices. Everyone in the class  $\,$ chose the "right to food".

"The class decided to take on the issue of child hunger by becoming young activists," says Mrs. Totten, "They were looking at the issue from a global perspective and decided they wanted to help children in places like Africa. They decided on a goal of \$300 and starting picking out items from the World Vision Catalogue."

The students decided to hold two fund raisers to reach their \$300 goal, the first was a Gym-a-thon, where they would receive sponsors to complete activities in the gym and the second was a Talent

"We held the first event on January 30th and were amazed to surpass our initial

goal, with \$600 in donations," says Mrs. Totten. "We decided to continue on with the Talent Show, and instead of asking for donations, the students would use the event to raise awareness of child hunger both locally and globally."

The whole school got involved, helping with the Talent Show on Feb. 17th, and Mrs. Rushton's grade Primary/ One class collected over 100 items for the Colchester Food Bank, to help with child hunger at the local level.

Mrs. Totten's Grade 3/4 students enjoyed looking through the World Vision catalogue once again, now with double the amount of money to spend, making careful

decisions on which gifts were the best use of their money. Kathleen Smeltzer said she was really excited when they more than doubled their goal, April Sharpe thought it was helpful for people to feel generous and Jenna Otterson also thought it felt good to help someone somewhere else.

The class finally decided to donate 15 fruit trees, 1 goat pack (includes 1 goat, 2 hens and a rooster), 2 pigs, 1 goat and clean drinking water for two families.

These seven families receiving this assistance will know elementary students far across the globe, in Great Village, really care for others.
