A banquet was held at Trinity United Church, on Jan. 31st, to celebrate the completion of the 2012 Harvest 4 Hunger NS Canadian Foodgrains Bank project.

John Longhurst, Director of Communications and Marketing for Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFG), Winnipeg was a guest speaker. He told the audience there were 256 growing projects across Canada using innovative ways such as growing grain, corn and pumpkins, or hosting bake sales or concerts, but all bringing together community for one common purpose.

Mr. Longhurst has visited places around the world where the CFG is supporting projects and he said they all say, "Please go back home and say thank you."

This is the 30th Anniversary of the CFG and since its inception there have been over 1.6 million tonnes of food, worth \$600 million, delivered to 78 countries around the world. "Thank you on behalf of those who are enjoying life because of what you have done," said Longhurst.

Trinity United Church Treasurer, Frank Hoyt presented Mr. Longhurst with a cheque for \$15,000, money raised from the 2012 H4H-NS project.

Brenda Leenders, CFGB NS Coordinator, thanked everyone for their dedication to the local project including the Canadian Government. She paid special tribute to supporter Lynn Erskine, a marathoner, who tragically died in September, 2012 while training for a run to raise money for the Foodgrains Bank. Brenda finished off by saying, "I am so proud of everyone...let's do it again this year!"

Rev. Gerry Kerr thanked Project Chair Ian MacHattie, who he said was often "hard to keep up with", noting what a great team Brenda and Ian have been. He was pleased his congregation at Trinity United Church could be a part of such an important outreach project, partnering with the community, saying he learned, "you don't have to be out front, but can work with a group and be part of the larger effort."

Volunteers provide meals to the elderly, serve Church suppers and sit on board of directors that deliver health care services. Volunteers and non-profit organizations play a critical role in every community across Canada.

The organizations within the voluntary sector represent a broad range of activities and touch almost every aspect of Nova Scotians' lives. They provide essential services upon

Did you know that 453,000 Nova Scotians volunteer? That rates of volunteerism has increased 7% between 2004 and 2007 but the average hours of volunteerism declined? 65% of Nova Scotian youth volunteer and they are the highest rate of all age groups! 44% of Nova Scotian seniors volunteer. And just to make a good point - Volunteers contribute \$1.8 billion worth of services to the Nova Scotia economy.

Do you volunteer? If you are saying "yes, but I don't have the time..." think of all those who have found those extra minutes to give back to this community.
