



Taxi By-law Passes First Reading

It seems like a long time ago, but with Municipal Council holding its monthly meeting the day after the last Shoreline was published, I've composed notes from the meeting of January 29th.

The first items of business were approval of the standing committee reports and recommendations from council committee of December 11, 2014 and January 15th; Executive and Audit Committee meeting of January 14th, and Sewer Use Appeals Committee of January 14th.

Taxi By-law: Under action items council approved the first reading of a taxi by-law, which has been in the works for years. Second reading will be held at council's monthly meeting on February 26th. All councillors voted in favour except councillor Cooper who voted "nay".

Boundary review: Council approved a minor revision in polling districts 7 & 8, affecting only a handful of properties in the Earltown area.

Non-Profit Organizations Presentations: Non-Profit organizations had until January 31st to submit applications, and will be given 10 minutes each to state their case on Tuesday, March 3rd commencing at 5:30 pm.

2015 FCM Conference: Mayor Taylor, Deputy Mayor Masters, CAO Ramesh Ummat and three councillors - Taggart, Cooper and Cavanaugh will attend the Federation of Canadian Municipalities AGM in Edmonton, May 5-8.

Biosolids Facility Upgrades: Council approved three tenders for conveyors, Grinders / pumps at Polymer Systems at the cost of \$470,477. (See separate story for more details).

Masters Grand Slam Curling: "Master of Curling" is slated to be held at RECC October 27th to November 1st, which would bring 15

Men's and 15 Women's top curling teams to the area. The local host committee is anticipating expenditures of \$35,000.00. Council approved \$17,500.00 towards the expenses of the Local Host committee. The committee is seeking a similar amount from the Town of Truro. RECC and Sportsnet, which directs and operates the Masters of Curling. Councillor Taggart asked that word be sent to the television people to get lots of activity shots concerning the Bay of Fundy. RECC and the host committee are entitled to 100% of the first \$100,000 in ticket revenues, after which revenues are split 50/50 between the host community and Sportsnet.

New equipment for RECC: New equipment totalling \$124,415 to better handle staging, storage units, man-lift and sliding stanchions for concerts and events is being sought for RECC. Council approved \$31,103.75 from remaining CoRDA funds, with the remainder to come from an application being made to ACOA under the Innovative Communities Fund. If RECC hosts five concerts a year, the entire cost would be recovered within three years.

Correspondence: Council approved a \$500 donation to the Centre of the Arts at Creamery Square in Tatamagouche, which is a \$1.8-Million facility. A request from David Stevenson, NS Electric Vehicle Highway Services to assist with installation of electric vehicle charging stations in Bass River, Bible Hill and Brookfield was referred to staff. Letter from Truro Horseman's Club for relief on property taxation was referred to staff. With regard to demolition of the former Salmon River School council stated all fixed assets to remain in the school and negotiations are to be held with the contractor chosen for demolition. Branch 26 Royal Canadian Legion had requested donation of several items in the building.
