

Council to Tour N-Viro Biosolids Facility

Council members, staff and some invited residents from Lower Truro and Crowes Mills Road will tour the N-Viro Facility at Aerotech Park, Halifax Airport on March 15th. They will leave Truro at 4:30 pm. The tour resulted as a follow-up to council's request to have Ms. Lise LeBlanc of LP Consulting Solutions make a presentation to council on the storage and application of biosolids in Crowes Mills.

Construction of a new Subway Restaurant in Tatamagouche along with other commercial developments will require the replacement of 100 metres of sewer pipe at the front of the Main Street property prior to start of construction in spring 2016.

Council's capital budget includes five phases of sewer upgrades in Tatamagouche at the cost of \$1.325-Million over the next five years. Two phases were completed in summer 2015 by SW Weeks Construction. Final phases will be completed in 2019/2020.

Council approved SW Weeks Construction replace

the 100 meters of sewer pipe at a cost of \$81,500, excluding taxes, as an extension to their 2015 contract.

In other action items, Councillor Stewart added security of the municipal building to the agenda noting security needs to be improved, it is not efficient and there is no control over who is roaming through the building.

County solicitor, Dennis James, is in the process of writing a letter to Department of Justice to decide on their long term intentions for court house occupancy in the building. A report is to be presented to council at its March Meeting.

Councillor MacInnes added Rodents to the agenda, because he has been getting complaints from residents around rat infestation at several properties. It was noted laying down poison is not possible, because of other animals, such as pets, birds, etc. Many councillors felt it the food source was eliminated, then rat problems would cease. It was also noted that bird feeders are a major source of food and often

attract rats and other rodents.

The concern about possible lack of parking close to the new library has been raised by several elderly residents, who frequent the library regularly. Even though the county participated in funding, it was a Town of Truro project. Contact will be made with the Town and the Public Library Board to express concerns from the public.

In 1985 the school moved to its present location using the Debert Airfield for flying and the facilities at the Nova Scotia Agriculture College in Bible Hill for accommodations, ground school, and administration. In 2005 the school relocated accommodations, ground school, and administration to the Debert Hospitality Centre.

There was an uproar from municipal officials and Debert area residents in 2010 when without much advance notice the school moved accommodations and ground school back to the Nova Scotia Agriculture College while administration and other support staff operated in Debert.

During the spring and fall, the gliders are staffed and located throughout the Atlantic Provinces to provide a familiarization flight to each cadet from every squadron. The gliders can be found in Debert, Gander, Greenwood, Miramichi, Port

Hawkesbury, Stephenville, Summerside and Sydney.

The primary objective of every summer in Debert is to give fifty cadets about ten hours flying experience to train them for a Transport Canada Glider Pilot License. The following summer, many of the cadets who received their Glider License continue with their flight training and gain their Transport Canada Private Pilot License through the Air Cadet Flying Scholarship Program.

From conception, the Royal Canadian Air Cadets program has been a partnership between a civilian authority, the Air Cadet League of Canada and the Department of National Defence.

Air Cadet Gliding Program where the Air Cadet Leagues of each province owns the gliders, tow planes, and tow vehicles. DND services and operates the aircraft and vehicles, and provides the officers and instructors.
