the government, the Cumberland South Liberal Association see the upcoming by-election as a great opportunity to add another seat to the provincial party's majority status. Scott Lockhart, who had served as constituency association president, resigned the volunteer position shortly after filing his nomination papers.

Lockhart, a 56-year-old Springhill native, had sought the party's nomination in the 2016 provincial election, but

lost out to Kenny John Jackson who carried the party banner in three election attempts. Previously, Lockhart left the provincial Progressive Conservative Party, about the same time Bill Casey won the nomination to run federally for the Liberals.


Lockhart's opposition for the nomination will come from Brian Sanderson, regional water specialist with State Chemical, who filed his papers in mid-February. Brian and his family reside in Upper Nappan and over the years he has been busy in the community as Basketball
