Michaela Priest and Carlie Barnhill report the following: "On April 8th we were excited to have a visit from Melissa Naugler who had just adopted 2 children from Haiti. Ms. Naugler, a sister of one of our Educational Assistants, was thrilled to hear of our efforts to help Haiti. She wanted us to be more informed about this horrific event. She told us that the earthquake happened at supper time and it only took 38seconds for it to destroy most of Port-au-Prince. Her new son who is only 4years old had just

left the supper table to get a drink when the wall near his table collapsed. If timing had been slightly different Dieulando, the Haitian boy, would have been crushed. Ms. Naugler was relieved that her daughter, Dakencia, who is 9 years old was not in this particular area at the time of the earthquake. Ms. Naugler and her husband Gerry had started the adoption process prior to the earthquake so they were very concerned about their family when word arrived of the catastrophe. Relief that their children were not injured was followed by a time of stress while they awaited permission to get them to Canada. The flight itself took 4 hours delivering 20 Haitian children to their new Canadian families and each child on that flight had an adult with them as it was the first time they had ever flown. Ms. Naugler was able to give us some clear visuals as to how quickly 38 seconds passes and she also let us see what the living conditions in Haiti were like both before and after the earthquake. We have learned a lot from her visit and hope to continue in our efforts to help the people of Haiti by collecting band-aids to send them."
