Geldart's Passion: Collecting Firefighting Memorabilia

Don Geldart's collection would be any little boy's dream come true. Hundreds of fire trucks and other firefighting memorabilia line shelf after shelf all around his den.

Don has been collecting anything relating to firefighting since he was 24 years old but his hobby has gotten more serious in the last 10 or 15 years.

Firefighting has been a big part of his life for the last 36 years. He was a career fire fighter for DND in Halifax and Debert, then a volunteer firefighter with Onslow Belmont Fire Brigade for 20 years and a member of the Debert Fire Brigade for the past 14 years, where he is currently Deputy Chief.

His collection is extensive, with pressed steel toy trucks from the early 50's to modern day Code 3 1/64th scale replicas of fire trucks currently in service. There are a number of 1/50th scale Corgi trucks from the 1950's and over the last eight years he has been adding one of the Hallmark collectable trucks each year.

Don spends many hours making scale models of fire trucks. A few of these are kits but the majority he has made from scratch. He carves and cuts out little bits of sheet plastic and once painted they look exactly like a piece of turn out gear, hose nozzle or whatever he envisions. "You

can't just buy these things," says Don. "I use various things to make it look real, like solder for hose, and then paint it the actual colors."

By the looks of the finely crafted vehicles on display, he has certainly perfected his craft. It takes a close-up look to pick out all the miniature details Don has carefully placed on each truck. His dream is to one day do a model of one of the old Scot Trucks from Debert. "I will have to build the cab and everything for that one," he says.

At one end of the den, the ceiling is lined with helmets, many Don has actually worn over his years of fire service but he has been given a few as well. He often gets calls from people who find something firefighting related and ask if might be interested and it is not hard to find a Christmas gift for such an avid collector. "I collect anything from 1/87th scale to 1/25th, and everything in between," he laughs.
