## **Central Nova Scotia Civic Centre GOES "GREEN"**

In today's world there are many environmental concerns that are at the forefront of local and national news; from pollution of the water we drink, to the way we dispose of our daily "waste". I'm pleased to say that our region continues to be pro-active with many of the environmental concerns of today. Our children are learning the importance of composting and recycling at a very young age in our school system, and at home with the new regulations for waste disposal.

The environment has also

been a top priority for the Central Nova Scotia Civic Centre from the early stages of design and construction planning. The movement towards a "green" building is a responsible path that can have both environmental and financial benefits, particularly in regards to long term operating costs. The Project Steering Committee has made every effort to meet a LEED® Designation. Leadership in Energy & Environment Design (LEED®) is an internationally recognized green building certification system where a thirdparty will designate credits or points for implementing strategies to improve the overall performance in areas such as energy savings, water efficiency and improved indoor environmental quality.

One of the many ways the

Civic Centre will strive to meet this certification is with the concrete being used in the construction of the facility, as it is no ordinary concrete block - its better. A local business, Casey Concrete, is using recycled window glass to make the concrete blocks instead of sending the glass off to the landfill where it would typically end up. Casey Concrete has diverted 3000 tons of waste glass to be used. The new Centre will be the first facility to benefit from this product and because of the environmental advantages the project will receive LEED® points towards its goal of a SILVER Designation. When construction is complete, a total of 180,000 blocks will have been used for the new Centre.

Other initiatives that will be implemented at the centre are the use of bike racks to promote good health for the community and to promote green modes of transportation; all fixtures in the washrooms will be a low flow and will have automatic controls where possible and the landscaping design will also encourage low water use. A healthy working environment will also be a priority by ensuring that select materials do not contain harmful chemicals and that there is an efficient balance of circulating fresh air and natural daylight entering the facility.

Planning for the new facility has also included strategies such as promoting healthy eating, physical activity, injury prevention, responsible alcohol use, no smoking regulations, baby friendly areas, as well as making the centre accessible to everyone in the community whether you may have a physical disability or economical restrictions.

The Central Nova Scotia Civic Centre which will be owned by the Town of Truro and the County of Colchester will be the first municipally owned LEED® building in Central Nova Scotia. It is envisioned that the Centre will be a local showcase for some of the most leading edge approaches of energy conservation, building technology and architectural design. It is sure to be a facility that our community and beyond can take great pride in for generations to come.

The community can also take much pride in the commitment and support shown to the Ignite the Spirit Campaign with volunteers continuing to work towards the campaign goal of \$5 million. Many individuals and businesses in the community and beyond have supported the project helping us to reach the \$4 million milestone, but it will take everyone's help to reach the finish line.
