I have repeatedly asked the Minister of Education to stop the attack on public education and I have asked that the Minister of Finance stop playing games with the students of this province. Both have

I have asked all members of the NDP Caucus to sign a petition (Kids Not Cuts) to show their support for our students. Once again they have refused. We know that in Colchester County there are three elected members, Colchester/Musquodoboit Valley, Truro/Bible Hill and Colchester North. I am disappointed to say that of those three, I was the only one to publically show support for students and sign that petition. In fact, all members of the NDP Caucus voted against that request. The Minister of Education who should be the champion for our students

and who was once a classroom teacher, has failed to stand up for students.

The Minister of Finance has used declining enrollment to justify cuts to education. I know that declining enrollment is already accommodated through the funding formula that is used to provide funding to School Boards. However, School Boards have been forced to cut and will continue to cut positions within their Board well beyond those positions lost due to declining enrollment.

In addition to taking money away from front line workers like teachers in the

education system and health care workers in our province, this NDP government continues to allow power rates to rise and gasoline prices to escalate.

The Leader of the Official Opposition and Leader of the Liberal Party, Stephen McNeil, has asked repeatedly that the Premier address some of these rising costs that are making it less affordable for Nova Scotians to make ends meet. In fact, he introduced legislation that would break the monopoly that Nova Scotia Power has in this province.

He has also called for an audit of Nova Scotia Power which would disclose the

huge bonuses paid to some of their employees. Once again members of the NDP government voted against this legislation, legislation that was designed to make it easier for you to pay your bills. Without this legislation Nova Scotia Power will continue to give their profits to their parent company Emera and it will allow Emera to continue to invest that profit in the Caribbean and other places rather than here in Nova Scotia.

That profit is part of your hard earned dollars and mine and I want those profits to stav in Nova Scotia.
