Wentworth United Church Women – A Historical Recap

Ethel Gilroy recently celebrated her 80th birthday in the company of the Wentworth United Church Women at the hall of the Wentworth United Church. Members of the UCW wished to pay a special tribute to Gilroy as she has been an excellent treasurer since 1976, which spans 37 years.

Going back in Wentworth history, women joined together to raise funds for local churches and community needs. Prior to United Church Union in 1925, this volunteer work was largely done by the Methodists with their organization of the Ladies Aid at the Wentworth Methodist Church "on the hill" at Wentworth Centre for the purpose of helping their three Methodists Churches at the Centre, Lake Road and Victoria. The Presbyterian and Baptist Churches of Wentworth had no women's organizations at that time in their congregations.

In a photo taken by my aunt Greta Tuttle, the members of the Wentworth Ladies Aid are standing as a group. In the photo I see my grandmother Ella Tuttle and my mother Lillian Tuttle. Current members of the UCW may also see their parents, grandparents or other relatives in the photo: Bessie Swallow with son Kenny, Alta Myers, Gussie Betts, Gladys Swallow, Fannie Swallow, Gertrude Henderson, Ann Beebe, Rose Tuttle, Ada Swallow, and Etta Myers. At that time members of the Baptist Church came and joined the Ladies Aid.

Members of Ladies Aid met on a rotation basis at each other's homes. Later, West Wentworth and Upper Wentworth established Ladies Aid units. Units met separately, but arranged a "general meeting" for all at specific times. Although Ladies Aids were officially declared WA's earlier in 1926, the United Church General Council in Toronto again in 1941 decreed the Ladies Aids be called Woman's Associations (WA's), although West Wentworth members still continued to call themselves Ladies Aid. Both Ladies Aid and WA's were active groups and met monthly raising funds for local purposes by quilting, "fancy work," box socials, and suppers in homes. Members paid a 10 cents fee at each meeting. Before cars became the main source of travel, women, single or married, walked or came by horse and buggy or sleigh to monthly meetings. If husbands came, they would talk in the kitchen while the women worked in the front room. All would gather

together for a meal with the men then paying 10 cents. As Ladies Aid/WA's worked solely to raise local funds, the women wished to add a missionary component to their work and in 1947 formed a Women's Missionary Society (WMS) for the entire pastoral charge,

After United Church Union in 1925, the members of both the United Church and Baptist Church still worked together in Ladies Aid, but reorganized so that each had separate treasurers, divided all proceeds equally except for the 10 cents fee at meetings, and alternated executive officers. Each summer, the United Church members and Baptist members each had two separate events for fund raising: The United Church had a Tea Meeting at the Wentworth "flats" and the Baptist members had a Strawberry Festival

In 1962, the United Church General Council in Toronto officially combined the WA's and WMS' into one organization called the United Church Women. After several years of debate from 1986 to 1991, the three units of the WA's located at West Wentworth, the Valley and the Centre voted on January 1, 1992 to amalgamate on a one-year trial basis into one unit located at the new church built in 1964 across the road from the "old church on the hill." Fortunately, the vote held for future years. Members still met in each other's home until the late 1990's when they began meeting in the United Church hall downstairs from the sanctuary.

The UCW members now meet every Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. to quilt as a fund-raiser, with time out each month for three Bible Studies and one UCW business meeting. Baptists attend as well, still following tradition. Quilting members like the social aspect of quilting together despite, at times, sore fingers, thumbs, shoulders, arms and backs. Some quilters are such expert observers that they can recognize another quilter's work by her stitches. Other fund-raising is done by catering and by stocking a table with UCW items at community events.
