19,000 Visit Interpretive Centre

A crowd of approximately 50 people gathered at The Hall to get an update from FORCE on the tidal industry. Gerard Cormier and Tom McLaren welcomed the speakers, FORCE discussed their FAST underwater monitoring platforms, which are now in sea trials in the Minas Passage.

FORCE also announced a new \$500,000 environmental monitoring program, with tenders out for four separate programs: fish, marine mammal, seabirds, and lobsters.

Developers discussed their progress, with one company, Cape Sharp Tidal, nearing the completion of two turbines and getting ready for deployment in Fundy in spring 2016.

Melissa Oldrieve, the province's tidal policy lead, discussed new legislation that sets rules for projects, including special areas for development, and the importance of environmental monitoring.

FORCE's facility manager, Mary McPhee, closed the formal presentations with an overview of activity and visitors to the site.

2015 was a banner year with over 5,400 people making the trek to FORCE. Since the Interpretive Centre opened, it has hosted over 19,000 visitors today. As activity increases with more turbines in the water, the Centre

is expected to be significantly increase visitors to the area. To date the visitor origins comprise 55% from Nova Scotia; 20% the rest of Canada; 12% from USA and 5% overseas.

Attendees had questions about local benefits, which Nova Scotia companies were working, and how the long term cost of electricity would come down.



90 Students Visited FORCE on April 18TH

FORCE continues to attract visitors to the Parrsboro area. The latest example occurred on April 18th when 90 students and 15 chaperones from the Spring Street Academy Elementary School made a tour of FORCE (Fundy Ocean Research Center for Energy) as their end of year class trip.

Following nearly a two hour tour at FORCE's Interpretive Centre, the student participated in a Tidal Art Meets Science Class at the Parrsboro Legion. The class was conducted by artist, Darlene Morrison, in partnership with Minas Energy and the Cumberland Energy Authority. Morrison was assisted by John Woods, VP Energy Development, Minas Energy.

The session started with a short presentation on science and engineering principles

associated with renewable energy. However, the real attraction came immediately after when students were asked to apply imagination, manual dexterity and a love for art in creating their personal version of what is possible at the FORCE site.

Materials such as recycled plastics, bits of wire, modeling clay, straight pins, and discarded items that often find their way into landfills were transformed as young hands fashioned a marine scene that brings together the various

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


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Parrsboro Shore Hospitality Trade Fair

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
