class. Parents are also asked to review expectations for their child when crossing the road. The following rhyme may be helpful: Stop, look and listen before you cross the street. Use your eyes, use your ears, and then you use your feet.

The Discovery Centre recently made a visit to the school through their "Science on the Road" program. Each class participated in a hands-on curriculum-based lesson with Kara, the Discovery Centre educator. Students in the Grade P/1 class worked in groups to build a structure using a variety of materials. In this Storm Structures presentation, the goal was to build a structure that could keep the rain out. The Grade 2/3 class learned about magnetism in their Invisible Forces presentation. A highlight was seeing the plasma globe (static electricity ball) in action. Bridging the Gap was the topic in the Grade 3/4 class where students worked together to build a bridge that could withstand a certain weight.

Hosting a "Community Skate" was new to the school this year. Schools can apply to use local recreation facilities free of charge for a limited number of times. GVES had more passes to the West Colchester United Arena than they could use during the school day, so those who were interested and able, had an opportunity to skate with schoolmates outside the regular school day.

Parents are reminded that there is no school for students on March 29th. Report cards were sent home at the end of March followed by student-led conferences. For student-led conferences, students come to the school with their parents to be able to present a variety of the work completed during the school year, and to demonstrate how materials such as math manipulatives, are used to support teaching and learning. On the afternoon of March 29th, teachers will work with a math mentor on the topic of mathematical problem solving.

There are several activities to look forward to in April. On April 10th, a representative from Green Schools will be visiting each classroom for a presentation on helping to keep our Earth green. The following day, there is a school trip planned to Colchester East Hants Regional Library and the Colchester Historium. The week will end with children's author Sheree Fitch offering a Writer's Workshop in each classroom. The school feels very fortunate and appreciative of the many extra opportunities for their students.

Minutes of previous meeting which were approved at the February 28 meeting of council revealed three things not previously covered in the Shoreline Journal.

Colchester Council approved Councillor Taggart's go forward to serve another year on the national Board of directors for the Federation of Municipalities.

He has served on the FCM Board for several years and asked council to consider the matter in February as he would be away during the upcoming meeting and to meet the FCM deadline.

Taggart has risen at the board level and has been servicing as Chair of the committee dealing with rural issues. Council approved his request.

Minutes of previous meeting which were approved at the meeting at end of February revealed two items from an in-camera ses-

sion of council held on January 31st. Minutes stated: Negotiations on Library Funding moved by Deputy Mayor Stewart, seconded by Councillor Cooper, "That discussions on Library Funding be referred to staff and that this be brought to February Committee for discussion in Closed Session; and Council grants authority to February Committee to make a decision on this matter."

It would appear the popular "Mud Hero" event held early Fall 2018 in Debert will be back again in 2019. Details have not been made public but minutes from an in-camera session states: Council authorizes the Mayor and CAO to sign the agreement with Crazy Canuck Events Corporation, with the discussed amendments."

Moved by Councillor Masters, seconded by Councillor Pash received unanimous consent.
