## Learning to Sing with Our Ears and Our Hearts

Who knew you could sing with your ears?? Well, the participants in the Songs from the Heart workshop in Parrsboro heard exactly that message from Stephen Muise, conductor of the Men of the Deeps choir. The workshop was held over 2 days in the Parrsboro Band Association's Hall and featured over 20 participants.

Muise encouraged the singers to "hear" the notes that make up each chord and find the place

where their voice fit. Working through five pieces of east coast music gave the group lots of opportunities to do just that.

Workshop participants included some of the members of the Parrsboro Citizens' Choir, some folks who had never sung in an organized group before, people from other communities in NS and a few from various Open Mics in the area. They were guided in the preparation for performance of no less than five separate choral pieces, all the while being encouraged to "sing from the heart", not merely the dots on the page.

The participants worked all day Saturday, and again on Sunday morning learning warm up, breathing and vocal skills and putting them all into practical use. Sunday afternoon the group presented their efforts, along with several other solo and group vocal performances to an extremely receptive and appreciative audience.

"I was immensely gratified, so many of our local group decided to not only attend, but participate

fully and in some cases, beyond their own comfort zones", said David Towns, conductor of the Parrsboro Citizens' Choir.

Interspersed with the choral direction, Muise provided the group with many stories of the Men of the Deeps choir and especially stories of mine disasters of days gone by. All of the singers in the Men of the Deeps have been miners, and many suffered personal loss from the accidents in the mines. They truly are a brotherhood, and always sing with emotion wearing their hearts on their sleeves. Muise encouraged the workshop participants to remember these stories, as they sang songs such as "Working Man" and "The Ballad of Springhill".

Next up in The Hall's workshop series for 2019 is a Song-Writing workshop on May 11th and 12th. This workshop will be led by Long Sault Trio from MacDonald's Corners, Ontario, and participants will collaborate to write an original song. The workshop cost is \$30. On Sunday afternoon May 12, The Hall will feature a Mother's Day Tea prior to a performance featuring the workshop instructors and participants.
