Message from Justin Trudeau

(On April 18 Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau issued the following statement)

"One year ago, 22 Canadians were senselessly killed and three more were injured when a gunman went on a rampage in small towns across Nova Scotia.

"On this solemn anniversary, we hold the victims in our hearts and honour their memory. Their deaths devastated close-knit communities in Nova Scotia, and all Canadians. Our thoughts are with all of those who lost a family member, a friend, a neighbour, or a loved one, and with everyone who continues to live with the pain and sadness from this tragedy.

"Today, we also honour Constable Chad Morrison, who was injured when he encountered the gunman, and Constable Heidi Stevenson, who made the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty. These first responders, and many others, faced danger without hesitation. On some of the darkest days in Nova Scotia's history, we saw - through their extraordinary example - the best of this country.

"I hope all Canadians take a moment today to remember those whose lives were forever changed on April 18 and 19, 2020. To all Nova Scotians: No person or community should ever have to experience such senseless violence and loss. In the last year, you have met unimaginable tragedy with unimaginable strength, and have kept going. You are truly Nova Scotia Strong."

Nova Scotia March to Remember

Over 200 people took part in the March to Remember in Bible Hill on April 18th, 2021, one year after the mass shooting. Organizer Bev Beaton, mother of Nick Beaton (who lost his wife Kristen and unborn child), encouraged family and friends to attend with an emotional post on Facebook saying in part, "It's been a heck of a year, but there is only ONE first anniversary let's show them all that we are still all United together & have more strength to get answers for our loved ones & will never stop till we do."

The peaceful March began at Foodland, with many people carrying signs and flowers in remembrance of the 23 souls lost. The March ended at the RCMP headquarters.

Councillors Tom Taggart and Marie Irving-Benoit read an emotional prepared statement from the families. "We have become a family that NO ONE wanted to be in," read Councillor Taggart, "But we

have found so many loving caring people within this new family. We get to lean on each other and be there for each other in the drop of a hat. Because they all are truly the only ones who realize and understand what this journey has been truly like. A bond that will hold us together in the coming years."

The families thanked fellow Bluenosers, people across Canada and throughout the world for the love and support they have received this last year. They recognized the help the Municipality of Colchester has given the families, calling this "a shining light in this very dark year" and saying they have gone above and beyond what their job descriptions calls for, "Standing up for us when we just couldn't face another day."

Councillor Irving-Benoit read the family's emotional thank you to the RCMP officers. "All the great and brave officers that weekend with boots on the ground. You have

become a part of our families because like us your lives have been turned upside down and will never be the same. We all share the pain and heartache that happened that weekend. You are in our thoughts and prayers. We pray that you heal deep within your soul and that you too come out on the other side stronger. May God bless each and everyone of you brace souls that had your boots on the ground that weekend and still bravely get

When we continue to support one another with kindness and generosity, we prove that LOVE wins the day, and that violence does not - and will never - define us."


