October 3, 1956 - A fire of undetermined origin last night completely destroyed the Fundy dance hall near Great Village. Believed to have started at about 6:45 pm., the blaze made quick headway despite the efforts of the Great Village volunteer firemen and the building was leveled about one hour later. The firemen, with the aid of a pumper, were successful in preventing the fire from spreading to a nearby building housing a small store and an upper apartment.


