As publisher, when I visited the site and spoke with representatives from the community council, I felt a high level of discouragement and frustration. I immediately started thinking on what the

Shoreline Journal could do to help, in addition to just reporting the extent of the vandalism. It was on my mind for the remainder of the day. I decided to hold a subscription fundraiser and will donate 50% (\$11.50 from each subscription) to the Community Council. A special form has been mailed to every home in the area. The fundraiser is effective November 1 - 20.

It's difficult to say, who besides local citizens will attend, but I have contacted elected representatives from all three levels of government, RCMP and some business leaders, whom I felt would be interested in helping the citizens of Londonderry.

Other events being planned is a "Londonderry Community Council Repair Fund Raffle Draw". As of this writing, over 30 prizes valued at almost \$5,000.00 have been gathered. Tickets are \$5.00 each, 5 for \$20. The draw will be held at the community centre on January 6th.

Refreshments will be serviced by the Londonderry Community Council.

The next Council meeting will be in Oxford at the Seniors Centre, 31 Ellis Street, on November 21, 2012, at 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.






