Lawns in Lower Five Islands DESTROYED

A few residents in Lower Five Islands didn't plan on reconstructing their lawns, but it's being done for them. Seascape and O'Hearn Lane have been the main targets, although an area around the cemetery has been unwanted landscape activity.

When I learned about the unexpected activity, I called Gerry and Judy Roberts owners of Gemstow Bed and Breakfast. Judy agreed to get some photos of devastated lawns along the route she walks on a regular basis.

Properties belonging to Don and Brenda Pugsley and Jim Davis, who lives in Springhill, but has a property in Lower Five Islands have received the most damage. When I called Brenda Pugsley, she said they could not figure out was was causing the damage. Some people had suggested because of how much damage would happen in one night, it would have to be a large animal. Most suspected

However, she confirmed that upon returning home one night, she and Don found the culprits. They turned the car lights onto the lawn discovering three large raccoons tearing up the lawn.

At the time of our conversation, she didn't know what they were going to do. For a bit more than a week or two, they had tried live trapping, but that didn't' work. The raccoons upset the live trap, turning it on its side, then entered the trap retrieving the fish, which had been

added as bait. In another incident the raccoons knocked the live trap on its side and just walked around it.

Just before press time, I contacted the Pugsley's and Mr Davis, to update the situation. Mr Davis, who operates a carpentry business Springhill said tearing up off the lawns continues daily. At least five properties adjacent to him have been ravished including Arnie Warren's, Jim and Betty Ann Paris, plus other lots that are owned by Americans.

He and his wife believe crows a playing a big part in the situation. He and his wife stood in the window watching crows tearing away the sod. Crows would pick away at the sod, then fling back a strip that was approximately 16" by 3". He hasn't seen it, but a neighbor told him they have seen a raccoon on some of the properties early in the morning.

In a conversation Sunday afternoon, Brenda Pugsley also said the damage to the lawn is continuing unabated. They have more sightings of raccoons, than the first one a few weeks ago. She is mystified about what happens to the sod. Even though you replace a section about three feet square, there is still approximately six inches missing around the outside edges.

Although it's a mess, they have resolved themselves to do nothing until next spring, when they will bring in a large tiller to reconstruct the
