

E. Ruth Graham Authors New Book

E. Ruth Graham, Parrsboro, has authored a book about one of Nova Scotia's heroes' during WWII. From Nova Scotia to North Africa relates tales of WWII fighter pilot, Clayton Graham, who passed away in July at the age of 94 years.

C. L. Graham began telling Ruth Smith stories of his life as a fighter pilot with the RAF, patrolling the coast of England, engaging in combat over the burning sands of Libya and ferrying Spitfires and Kittyhawks to frontlines in the Mediterranean Theatre of War during WWII.

Smith a retired Medical Laboratory Technologist and caregiver to Graham immediately saw the need to record his history and stories which she compared to a "string of pearls". With the help of Graham's Log Book, Military Service Records, Squadron Records and many hours spent with the ninety one year old veter-


an, his story unfolded into a book, which is mainly a first-person account of Graham's experiences before, during and after WWII.

Graham related an incident in which he was show down near Churgia, Libya while escorting reconnaissance aircraft. After surviving the crash he was strafed by an enemy Me 109. Injured, bleeding and distraught, alone in the burning desert of North Africa, the young pilot leaned against his parachute and prayed, "Please, God, if you're ever going to help me, I need it now. Please don't let me die in this desolate wilderness".

The story is told with insight and humour, but it is also an emotional journey recounting narrow escapes, the loss of buddies, fear and loneliness, yet a journey met with strength and tenacity as he serves in the war effort in England, North Africa and Italy.

Flying Officer, Clayton Lorrison Graham passed away on July 21, 2013 at the age of 94 years.
