


# Dorothy's Kitchen Korner

I was busy this month and was going to write this column this morning, but Maurice informed me he wanted us to attend the last of the 2014 Economy Hall sessions, as Matt Minglewood was playing. I've seen Matt numerous times, but not so far this year, as we did not get to Sydney for the Cape Breton BikeFest at the end of July.



Natalie Elliott has been doing a great job organizing the Economy Hall Sessions, bringing a variety of musicians and entertainers to the shore. The sessions are an important fund raiser for the Economy Recreation Centre. For a small community with probably less than 500 people in the immediate area, they sure do a great job raising nearly \$40,000 each year to keep the centre open.

They also gave Maurice and I a tour of the fitness equipment set up in the basement. Volunteers from the community operate the centre from 9:00 - 10:00 am on Monday, Wednesday and Fridays, while other volunteers open the gym from 7:00 - 8:00 pm on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Maurice took some photos, which he'll publish next month.

Before I get into the kitchen, I must apologize. When I make a typing error, it definitely should not be in a recipe. Maurice got several calls wondering how much flour to use in Hazel Hill's Peanut Butter Cookie recipe I used last month. Missing from last month was One cup of flour. I've reprinted the recipe to correct my error.

## Peanut Butter Cookies

- ½ cup butter • ½ cup peanut butter
- 1 unbeaten egg • ½ cup brown sugar
- ½ cup white sugar • ½ tsp baking soda
- Large cup of flour

Mix soda and flour together. Cream sugar, butter and peanut butter. Add egg and sifted dry ingredients. Mix until uniform mixture. Roll in balls, press down with a fork. Bake in 350 oven for 10-12 minutes.

Since we all have a sweet tooth, I might as well continue with some cookies, which you can bake when using my corrected recipe. It never hurts to bake something different before it's needed. This recipe for Wartime Cake is excellent to freeze as we get closer to Christmas and want to have some sweet readily available when unexpected company comes for a visit.

## Wartime Cake (Fruit)

- 2 cups sugar • 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 cup shortening • 1 tsp cloves
- 2 cups cold water • 1 tsp allspice
- 1 lb seeded raisins • 1 tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp salt

Put all together and boil 3 minutes. Let cool, then add:

- 1 egg, well beaten
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 3 ½ cups flour
- 2 tsp soda, dissolved in 2 tsp warm water.

This recipe makes two loaves. Bake in 350 degree oven on centre rack. Some ovens do a better job at 325 degrees. Remove from loaf pans, when cool. Once totally cool, maybe overnight, wrap with two layer of saran or plastic wrap and put in the freezer.

## News from our Municipal Council - District 10

### Hello again. Hope all are well.

I would like to touch briefly today on what is being called a provincial financial review. It is a draft discussion paper prepared by the Provincial Department of Municipal Affairs and developed by a working group consisting of staff from Municipal Affairs and Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities. The purpose is to determine the most financially prudent path forward for Municipalities.

I need to state, at this point, it only a draft discussion paper and has not been endorsed by either the Provincial Government or Municipalities. It is a 120 page document and admittedly I have just buzzed through it at this point. We will have a full day of discussion/ debate on this next week. The three issues in this catching my attention are shared services, amalgamation and transfer of some roads and highways to Municipal responsibility.

On shared services, we are in good shape. Currently, we work hand-in-hand with Town of Truro on waste management, waste

## Producing SynGas to generate electricity

I wrote my last article for the Shoreline prior to the County delegation leaving for Pune India. On September 12th I, councillor Taggart, Mayor Taylor the County CAO Ramesh Ummat and our Director of Solid Waste Management Wayne Wamboldt departed for Pune India. The purpose of our trip to India was to research the proprietary technologies of a waste-to-energy gasification plant in Pune.

This gasification process is much different than other types in production throughout the world today. The plant we visited in Pune is a new form of gasification with no oxygen being used during the process. This technology was first patent by the German company, Concord Blue who has now entered into collaboration with Lockheed Martin to develop the technology in the North American market.

As previously mentioned this is proprietary technology so to best explain how it works without giving away any secrets I'll explain it this way. Your everyday household waste, which ends

- in launching air strikes against ISIL.

As a matter of fact a recent editorial in the Halifax Chronicle Herald said, "The Conservative government is right to commit Canada to join a coalition of countries ... that are seeking to contain and degrade the Islamic State before it becomes and even bigger threat to the stability both in the region and beyond."

We are also contributing one air-to-air refuelling aircraft, two Aurora CP-140 surveillance aircraft from CFB Greenwood right here in Nova Scotia, one of two bases in the country that use the Aurora and the necessary air crews and support personnel. In addition, we are extending the deployment announced in September of up to 69 members of the Canadian Armed Forces, in a non-combat role, to continue to advise and assist security forces in Iraq.

water, libraries and drinking water for those in the urban core. These are core services, as well as, the most costly and I feel the arrangement is working very well.

Amalgamation is a subject I would support. However I say this without any true background facts. As I noted above we currently work well together on shared services so one would think we could find other savings.

However, there would be many, many questions to be asked. Which municipal unit has a larger debt load? Who would be responsible to repay? Would it be spread out over the new region or remain where it belongs? Who has the largest infrastructure deficit?

You can be sure there would have to be many different tax

up on the tipping floor of our Balefill Facility everyday, would not be baled and placed in a cell and then covered. Instead it would flow through a gassifier reactor which receives heat energy through a pre-heated energy transfer source which has been heated to around 800 to 1000 degrees Celsius.

In the absence of oxygen or air, the household waste does not burn or incinerate, but is converted into a combination of gases. The gases generated are passed through a reformer to further purify them before being used. The gas produced is called syngas and is mainly made up of methane and hydrogen. The syngas would be used to power a syngas driven electric generator which generates electricity. This electricity would then be uploaded and sold on the grid.
