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This builds on the previous action our Government has taken to respond to the humanitarian crisis in Iraq. We dispatched relief supplies for refugees including tents, blankets, and kitchen and hygiene kits with the help of the Red Cross. We also continue to work with organizations such as Save the Children Canada and Mercy Corps. In addition to providing supplies to those displaced

by the violence, we are also providing medical supplies to health facilities, and helping with emergency repairs to water and sanitation facilities.

If left unhindered, this terrorist threat will only grow. That's why, as our allies have recognized and responded to ISIL, we've joined the cause. Canada will not stand on the sidelines, we will do our part. Our Conservative Government is standing up for the safety and security of Canadian families and innocent civilians

Founded in 1972 Denis Office has ten locations, eight in Quebec plus Maritime locations in Moncton and Charlottetown. Basin Basics will add three locations and approximately 40 staff to the Denis group, which already was among the largest employers in the office supply and furniture sector in Canada.

Michael Emberly and Donald King partnered to start Basin Stationery and Office Supplies Limited in northend Halifax in October 1979. The firm moved to a larger building on Lady Hammond Road, and moved again to its cur-

rent location on Strawberry Hill Street.

Donald King retired with Steven Emberly purchasing his shares in Basin, becoming Vice President and Purchasing Manager. Father and son have continued to work and build the company on the founding philosophy of customer service.

Basin Stationery, operating as Basin Basics Halifax, Basin Basics Truro and Highland Basics is a locally owned Nova Scotian company that services Mainland Nova Scotia. Basin Stationery have an Office Supply Storefront, Furniture Showroom, Warehouse and Distribution Centre at Suite 130, 3667 Strawberry Hill Street in Halifax.

In addition Basin has retail stores in Truro and

Antigonish; operates its own delivery trucks for the greater Halifax-Metro area. For deliveries outside the Halifax-Metro area, next day delivery via a number of different courier companies is offered depending on customers needs.

At the time of the sale last week, Basin had 39 full and part time employees including ten dedicated Office Supply and Furniture Representatives, and a telemarketing representative. Completing the staffing were two qualified furniture installers under contract.

Now with 13 locations and showrooms and 3 distribution centres, the family owned Denis Office Supplies is one of the largest office supply employers and is the largest independent suppli-

er of stationery products in Eastern Canada.

The transition is scheduled to take place officially on Saturday November 1, 2014. After the transaction is completed, Basin Basics Office Products will be renamed to Denis Office Supplies and Furniture.
