A Wentworth Tribute to Joe & Georgie Patriquin

The Wentworth Pioneers Club, together with two other Wentworth organizations paid tribute recently to Joe (Joseph) and Georgie (Georgina) Patriquin for doing many years of excellent volunteer work for their community and also for being kind and loving people. Residents of Wentworth from birth until 2015, Joe and Georgie decided to leave their Wentworth home in order to locate a home in Truro. The Wentworth community wishes Joe and Georgie the best in their new home, but also wishes them to know they will be greatly missed by the people of Wentworth.

After a Pioneers Club potluck supper at the Wentworth Recreation Centre, members and friends took time to pay Joe and Georgie a tribute of thanks, having made sure they would be attending the potluck supper, even though driving out from Truro. Joe and Georgie were always enthusiastic members of the Pioneer Club and hope to still attend meetings whenever they can.

In 2003 Joe received awards both in Amherst and later in Halifax for being chosen as Cumberland County Volunteer of the year. In Halifax Premier John F Hamm presented Joe with a Nova Scotia plaque which read: "2003 Provincial Volunteer Week presented to Joseph Patriquin [this plaque] in

recognition of exceptional volunteer service representing an outstanding volunteer of Nova Scotia." Two examples of Joe's volunteering were his 40 years as a volunteer firefighter at the Wentworth Volunteer Fire Department and his 70 years as choir member in the Wentworth United Church. Joe was also noted for his cheerful personality, his stories, and his jokes. He was known as a clever, skillful player at the card game Auction 45's.

Then, in 2005 Georgie also received awards as Cumberland County Volunteer of the year both in Amherst and in Halifax. Georgie did volunteer fundraising for cancer research by helping quilt the Ski Mount Everest quilt and taking part in Relay for Life. Georgie received a Gold Pin in 2004 for fundraising from the Canadian Cancer Society. Earlier in 1983 Georgie received a Certificate of Merit for fund-raising from the Canadian Red Cross. Georgie also helped at the Wild Blueberry Harvest Festival, the Valley Garden Club, youth events, church work, visiting hospitals and nursing homes, the Wentworth Pioneer Club, the Wentworth Recreation Centre, and other activities. Georgie's concerns reached wide from her home community to this province, to this nation and world wide (i.e. the Red Cross). Georgie was known for her kindness, her willing to help others in need,

and her sympathy when things were tough for others. She loved the game of Dominoes, laughed hard at jokes, and was very friendly.

Tributes were extended from representatives of the Pioneers Club; Wentworth Volunteer Fire Department

and the Wentworth Recreation Centre.

Thanks, Joe and Georgie for all your years in Wentworth, we will miss you living in our midst, and wish you the best at your home in Truro, a town which is lucky to have you living there.
