cated to their responsibilities to protect their community and are backed up with a very strong and dedicated auxiliary, who help in any way possible.

The fall Roast Pork fundraiser and the spring fish and chip supper in the spring are the two largest fund raising events of the brigade. Even though they are always successful, they are not enough to overcome the brigade's most pressing problem, a new First Responder vehicle.

Deputy Chief Spence, said the current vehicle needs to be replaced within the next year, as the current one will not pass inspection. It puts the small brigade in an unfavourable position. A new vehicle would cost \$40-\$50,000, but they don't have the funds.

Inserting a bit of humour into the situation, Spence said, "the province provides money for radios and other equipment but not for vehicles. I guess we could hear

what is going on but couldn't get there. I don't understand it, but that's the way it is".

Not to think lightly about the situation, they could approach the municipality to guarantee a loan, but before doing that they need to make sure they can meet the repayment schedule. The brigade is also looking at two other possibilities, perhaps one of the other brigades in the province might have an appropriate vehicle being removed from their fleet, or they could find a one ton cab and chassis and with proper conversion transfer the existing box to another vehicle.

If they were able to find a cab and chassis, they would prefer an extended cab, with capacity to carry more members. The other problem faced by the brigade is universal to nearly all brigades - an aging membership, and lack of interest from younger generations. It's a major problem in Rural Nova Scotia, because of out-migration. So many of the young talented people have had to move away to find employment.

Village Green Park to get New Swings

During the last council meeting prior to the municipal election, Colchester County council on September 29th approved Councillor MacInnes' attendance, plus a staff member to a Local Prosperity 2016 conference being held in Miramichi, NB, November 3-6.

The conference is to deal with "New Economics for Rural Canada". A note about the conference indicates it will focus on putting in place a new economic model for small and rural communities.

Information items presented to council included, one application received by the September 15th deadline under the community park program.

Staff has approved a grant of \$3,603.00 for the Upper Stewiacke Community Development Association for 46% of the project cost of \$7,823.75 for the purchase and installation of a 2-bay (4 swing) set for the Village Green Park.

Even though there was room in the department's budget, approved earlier this year, council is to be advised of approvals prior to issuance of cheques and notification of approval to

the applicants.

The Flood Advisory Committee (FAC) reported that based on a number of project delays, they would have sufficient room in their budget to cover the cost of a promotional video, which had been discussed at earlier committee meeting. FAC has limited the cost to a maximum of \$3,000.00.

A letter from Carol McKee, Capital Program Administration office, NSTIR regarding cost shared subdivision street for fiscal 2017-2018 was received for information.

Similarly a letter from Craig Cameron, President Fundy Trail Snowmobile Club, requesting \$3,000.00 to send two delegates to Wisconsin in recognition of the club being inducted in the International Snowmobile Hall of Fame was received for information on motions by Councillor's MacInnes and Cooper.

John Simms, 2nd Vice-President, Downeast Bluegrass & Oldtime Music Society in a letter dated September 26th, requested support for the 32nd Annual Eastern Canadian Bluegrass Awards Show to be held at CEC on October 15th. Staff reported they had tried to seek addition
