


Grade 2 student Ava Tanner runs a relay lap in the Great Village Elementary Terry Fox Run. (Submitted)


## Stewart now Colchester's Deputy Mayor

Councillor Geoff Stewart, District 3 councillor representing Brookfield, was elected Deputy Mayor at council's monthly meeting on October 25th. Council is obliged to elect a Deputy Mayor and an alternate chair for council committee meetings on the second anniversary following a municipal election.

Councillor Masters has served as the Deputy Mayor since October 25, 2012 and his term expired with the second anniversary since the municipal election in 2017. Nominations by council members included Stewart and Councillor Eric Boutilier. Stewart was declared the winner following voting by a secret ballot. Following the election results, councillor Boutilier placed motion on the table, the results be unanimous, which was passed by council.

Prior to being elected to Council, he served over 25 years with the Fire Service, serving as Fire Chief and was recognized twice as Officer of the Year. Among other committees, he was also involved in Minor

Since joining Council, he serves as the Chair of the Palliser Re-development Committee, Vice Chair of the Library Construction Committee, as well as being a member on the Library Board, Tourism Committee, Dangerous and Unsightly Committee, and the Truro and Colchester Chamber of Commerce.

In November Deputy Mayor Stewart will become past-president of the Nova Scotia Federation of Municipalities, a position he has held for one year.

ment program, Divert had been paying a \$200 per tonne fee to C & D Recycling in Goodwood for taking the discarded tires and shredding them into aggregate that can be used for highways, retaining walls, drainage, foundation backfilling and other products. Lafarge's bid landed the cement company 30 per cent of

the province's discarded tires over a five-year period. The company will be paid \$105 per tonne by Divert to take the 350,000 tires each year, if the pilot project is extended.

Plant upgrades are underway. The earliest that tires could be used as fuel would be late fall, possibly not starting until early in 2019.



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
