Film Production Incentives Announced

Documentary TV series, Ocean Playground, produced by Fancy Monster Media Inc., has been approved for a funding commitment of \$265,920 based on an eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$831,000. Documentary TV series, The Real Pigs of Norfolk County, produced by Drama Pig Production Inc. (Clerisy Entertainment), has been approved for a funding commitment of \$365,209 based on an eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$1,328,033. Documentary TV series, Hope for Wildlife Season 10, produced by Hope for Wildlife 10 Productions Inc. (Arcadia Entertainment), has been approved for a funding commitment of \$520,624 based on eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$1,626,950. Documentary TV series, Le Sens Du Punch II, produced by 3313268 Nova Scotia Limited (Connections Productions) has been approved for a funding commitment of \$153,609 based on eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$558,578. Documentary TV Series, The Alaska Triangle, produced by Ignite TV Inc. (Ocean Entertainment Limited), has been approved for a funding commitment of \$267,795 based on eligible Nova Scotia expenditure of \$973,800. Unemployment rate drops to 7.2%

Private sector employment has grown to over 300,000 jobs for the first time ever in Nova Scotia. In the month of September employment is up 3,200 to 466,900. The unemployment rate declined to 7.2 per cent. During the first nine months of this year, Nova Scotia's employment is up 11,000 compared with the same period in 2018. Most of the rise in employment is accounted for by private sector employment. Youth employment rose 7.9 per cent (4,700 jobs) in the first nine months of 2019 compared to the same months of 2018. The youth unemployment rate has averaged 13.3 per cent in 2019 - a drop from 16.5 per cent in the same months of 2018. Female employment is up 2.8 per cent (6,400 jobs) year-to-date and the female unemployment rate averaged 5.7 per cent through September. More regulations governing massage therapists

The Massage Therapist Titles Protection Act requires anyone using the title massage therapist, registered massage therapist or variations of the terms has to meet certain conditions first. Minister of Health and Wellness Randy Delorey says the changes will create consistency in the profession through professional standards and oversight. The legislation sets out requirements for massage therapists around education, liability insurance, membership in good standing in a recognized professional association and must provide information on criminal charges or convictions. Over the years massage therapists have formed associations to set standards for their profession on a voluntary basis. This bill will require everyone practising in this field to be a member of an association in Nova Scotia.

First all-indigenous class graduates

Nova Scotia's first all-Indigenous and all-journeypersons class has graduated from the Atlantic Trades Business Seal program. The continuing education program is giving its seven graduates the skills, confidence and tools they need to take on managerial roles and start their own company. The members of this year's graduating class represent three of the five First Nations in Unama'ki/Cape Breton. Graduates include three business owners, the director of housing for Potlotek First Nation, and a cook, carpenter and a truck and transport mechanic. All have earned a certificate of qualification bearing the red seal. As of March 31, there were 342 self-identified Aboriginal apprentices registered. This is an increase of almost nine per cent from the previous year and a 53 per cent increase in five years.


