## Community Links Creativity Campaign

Community Links is a non-profit organization operating since 1992 with the goal of ensuring older adults age well in their communities. Regional Coordinators work throughout the province to support coalitions which share their vision for age-friendly, inclusive communities.

## Pre-primary Program Implementation Complete

Every four-year-old in Nova Scotia now has access to pre-primary, a free, universal early learning program. Pre-primary is available in all 253 school communities with elementary schools. Government will invest about \$51.4 million this year to deliver the program.

In addition to universal pre-primary, the province has completed its rollout of bus-

ing for eligible pre-primary children. Access to busing reduces barriers for families, especially in rural areas, to access the program.

Families who wish to register their child for pre-primary can still contact their Regional Centre for Education or the Conseil scolaire acadien provincial.


