Jennings Family Receives Agricultural / Agri Food Award

are grown on 70 acres supplying Sobeys Atlantic Canada.

Egg production has grown to 14,000 layers and 14,000 replacement pullets annually.

The business has been a pioneer of renewable energy, first with the introduction of wind turbines in 2007, with the construction of a new, state-of-the-art facility powered by 90 solar panels eliminating a barn housing 11,000 layers from the grid.

The farmers are already looking to consider a possible expansion of the solar project and increase the land base for pumpkin and squash production.

The Jennings family has always been a strong community supporter, donating eggs to school breakfast programs, helping with events and local projects, and fundraising for various causes such as Chantelle's Cystic Fibrosis Pumpkin Blast event happening at the farm on Oct. 23- 24.

They are proud of their farm heritage and welcome visitors to see their operation.

This award recognizes an individual, group, an organization or business where the principles of running a successful agricultural or related operation are applied and result in a thriving and environmentally friendly endeavor. The enterprise must derive more than 50 per cent of its annual revenue from agricultural related activities.

For more than 130 years, Jennings's farm has operated on the Shore Road in Masstown. In the early years, the farm experimented in all areas of agriculture, including a variety of animals and crops, settling on dairy and eggs in the mid-1900s. In 1992, the farm was divided with one branch of the Jennings family taking the dairy farm and the other, now owned by Glen Jennings and assisted by his son Blake, focused on egg production.

In the 1990s, pumpkin patches were introduced, and under Blake's leadership, the "Pumpkin Jungle" has grown in popularity as a fall destination for locals and tourists alike. Pumpkins

square feet for display space. On the second day, his doors opened, a business in the neighborhood requiring a continuous supply of quality safety footwear for its employees connected with him, and a new long-time business relationship began enabling the business to grow.

Since that time, Mavi has grown his inventory selection to include good-quality Italian lady's footwear, purses, belts, and wallets. A skilled woodworker, he has used his talents to build raw-edged wooden shelves adding to the unique ambiance at his shop.

He said the diversification of his stock helped increase his customer base, and the store's footprint in Downtown Truro has grown to 1,100 square feet.

While COVID-19 had an impact, Mavi, the store's only staff, remained open without the benefit of any government funding programs. He said support from his landlord enabled him to keep the doors open in tough months, and his loyal customers kept coming in to shop. Things are looking up as sales are increasing by about 40 percent this year over last and new customers continue to stop by.

The store was also recently used as a film location for production by Jonathan Torrens.

He recently launched a new website supported by the Truro & Colchester Chamber of Commerce E-Commerce program. The business continues to grow its client base here, and he and his wife are taking English as a Second Language course to improve written communication with their customers.
