# Wentworth Valley's Fall Festival of Colours

experience Mainland Nova Scotia's most spectacular display of fall foliage Thanksgiving Weekend, Oct. 10 & 11 at Wentworth Valley's Fall Festival of Colours.

For a spectacular view of the colourful leaves, ride the chairlift to the top of Wentworth Mountain. It's one of the most amazing views you'll see of the Valley. Get your exercise walking back down the mountain. Please note: this is a one way trip only. There is no transportation down the mountain. Its recommended participants are in good physical condition, as the hike down can be physically demanding.

Due to extensive trail development and construction this summer associated with the 2011 Canada Winter Games, there will be no mountain biking permitted this year. Ski Wentworth is host venue for alpine and freestyle skiing for the Winter Games.

"New and existing trails have been recently seeded and are very fragile due to the construction this summer," said Leslie Wilson, Manager Ski General Wentworth. "There is concern mountain bike traffic

could cause damage to the trails.'

"We welcome folks to check out all the improvements and enhancements to the mountain, however we ask that everyone respects the fragility of the terrain and avoid walking on newly seeded areas. This event is weather permitting. Please check the website for updates at www.skiwentworth.ca.

Wilson says the Fall Festival of Colours continues to grow in popularity. 'We had record turnout last said "People are making it part of their family Thanksgiving tradition." The chairlift runs from 10am to 4pm. Cost is \$10 per person for a single trip, \$15 per person for a multi-trip pass or \$30 for a family. There will be a barbeque at the base of the mountain at noon.

The chairlift ride up takes about 20 minutes. The walk down is anywhere from 30 minutes to an hour. Its recommended participants are in relatively good physical condition as the hike can be demanding.

If you'd like some more direction to your day, why not take a guided hike to High Head? Depart 10am sharp from the Old Valley School House on Barclay Road for an 11km (three hour) hike to High Head with 'Chilkoot' Bob Hyslop. This is an intermediate level hike. This is a free tour, however, donations are gladly accepted for the Old Valley School House.

If you work up an appetite during your hike, the Wentworth Recreation Centre (two minutes from Ski Wentworth) is holding its annual Pork Dinner on Saturday, Oct. 10 from 4-6:30pm.

Hiking the Maritimes largest ski area is almost as
