"Brazil in Great Village" – October 3rd

Following the highly successful 2008 "Word in the Village" day of celebration of Elizabeth Bishop's connection to Great Village and Nova Scotia, Great Village is hosting "BRAZIL IN GREAT VILLAGE," another day-long of celebration on Saturday, October 3.

Great Village, Nova Scotia, was the most important place in Bishop's childhood. Brazil was the most important place in Bishop's adulthood. Elizabeth Bishop directly linked these two places in her imagination and art. She wrote some of her

most famous and best loved poems and stories about Nova Scotia during her fifteen years in Brazil in the 1950s and 1960s.

On Saturday, October 3, 2009, Great Village community organizations will host a series of events in celebration of Bishop's connection to Brazil and, through her, Brazil's connection to Nova Scotia. All are welcome to join in the fun and learn about Bishop's connection to Brazil and about Brazilian culture (music, dancing and food).

Bios of artists

Dende do Recife (www.dendedorecifehalifax.ca) is a capoeira group that was founded in 2005 by Contra-Mestre Azeitona, Contra-Mestre Fabio Cuenacas, and Monitora Paula. Their goal was to further develop capoeira here in Canada and to emphasize the style and culture of their home city: Recife in the province of Pernambuco in Brazil's Northeast. Contra-Mestre Azeitona leads the group in Halifax as he has done since he first arrived there in 2003. Along with Monitora Paula they have created a vibrant community around their skills as capoeira teachers, dancers and musicians. Dende Do Recife is actively running a dance studio in Halifax where there are weekly classes for children, beginners, and advanced students.

Paul Zann was born in Australia and emigrated to Canada with his wife and daughter (Truro-Bible Hill MLA Lenore Zann) in 1968. He has been a Writer-in-Community for the Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia. Paul's work has been published in England, Spain, Australia, United States, and extensively across Canada. His book of poetry, Crouching at the Keyhole, was published in 2007. Paul's children's book series about Australian animals, The Aussie Six, is published by Borealis Press in Ottawa.

John Barnstead was born in Schenectady, New York, where all good science fiction ideas originate. He is Associate Professor of Russian at Dalhousie University and President of the Elizabeth Bishop Society of Nova Scotia. Recently he was made a minor character in the Robert A. Heinlein/Spider Robinson novel Variable Star. In 2007 he founded Peregrination Press, dedicated to publishing new poetry, both Canadian and international, as well as essays in literary and social criticism. Peregrination Press titles include Tribute, by Toronto poet Shirley Small, and Riding the Hellbound Train, a book of essays, interviews, and stories by Tom Trumpinski. John is a sponsor of B.C. choreographer Jeanne Robinson's Stardance Project, further information about which may be found at www.stardancemovie.com.

Cocada, with Brookfield piano teacher and composer Joanne Hatfield on guitar and vocals, Jef Wirchenko on double bass, and Dawn Hatfield on flute, began with Joanne's interest in Brazilian music and her learning to play and sing many Bossa Nova standards. Dawn, a music educator, composer and performer, is a versatile musician who plays baritone sax, flute and ukulele. Jef, at age sixteen, began his professional career as a musician with singer/songwriter Shirley Jackson. Well-known as a blues bassist, Jef explores many styles of music, playing in a variety of ensembles. This trio found themselves playing together for fun at campfire jams. Now they are pleased to offer their easy-going take on Brazilian standards, along with lesser-known pieces of that country, and original Cocada compositions.

Carmen Klassen has lived in Nova Scotia for the past 11 years. She spent most of her youth in Thunder Bay, Ontario, where she landed her first job at CBC-Radio. She moved to Halifax for another job as regional arts reporter with CBC, and has subsequently hosted the afternoon show out of Halifax, and worked on Maritime Noon as well. She is presently filling in on All the Best on CBC-Radio 1. And stay tuned – news of another spot on the CBC airwaves is coming soon.

In **Jim Wyatt's** earlier life he was an air force navigator, an administrator, an active volunteer, a farmer as well as a lawyer. Now he is a volunteer on the district Health Board and with Joy, he runs the Joy Laking Gallery.

Joy Snihur Wyatt Laking has been a painter all her life. The daughter of an artist, she graduated from university with a degree in Fine Arts in 1972. - Consult your waste collection calendar to determine when clean up will be occurring in your neighborhood


