Two hundred and fifty people packed the West Colchester Consolidated School auditorium in a show of support for the Bass River Credit Union at a meeting on community September 20th. Emotions ran high when local residents stepped up to the mic and voiced their opinions, pleading

with the Board of Directors to keep the doors open.

Valerie Meredith, Chair of the Bass River Branch Committee, created to try to save the Credit Union, opened the meeting. She introduced the head table and wasted no time getting right to the point saying, "This is our Credit Union. We are the only ones

Branch CEO, Darrell Kuhn came to the microphone with high praise for the Branch Committee saying he and the Board Members were here, "Because of a passionate discussion held a few days ago by these people." He went on to say, "And we are are now looking at the same level of passion from the people gathered in this room."

Kuhn stated the recommended closure of the Bass of the River Branch Community Credit Union was based on detailed assessment which included financial, demographic and economic challenges. He assured those present that these challenges are not unique to Bass River. The simple facts are the current lending business is not sufficient to support or sustain the branch.

The credit union board of directors will not be meeting until after this issue has gone to press.

Board Chair, Charlotte MacVicar, issued the following

statement to the Shoreline's inquiry, "This community meeting was requested by the Board to determine the level of commitment from the membership and community at large. While we were pleased with the turn out, we must all be cognizant that it represented only 25% of the entire membership. The Bass River branch of Community Credit Union has required more commitment from the members specifically in transferring their lending business to the branch - this demonstrates support and has not been evident for many years. The Board will assess whether an extension is warranted - a meeting is planned

How Sweet It Is!

If you have access to agricultural land and machinery why not experiment growing something new? Brandon and Jonathan Millen will have to wait until their 2 acre crop of sweet potatoes is harvested and sold before they will know if a new venture is worth repeating, but so far

everything looks promising. The brother's partnership, J & B Millen Farms, follows closely in the footsteps of their father Curtis Millen, who has been commercially growing strawberries for a number of years. Brandon and Jonathan

have been growing a variety of vegetables for the last few years and this year decided to give sweet potatoes a try.

Maddi Bushen and Dolorian Clark proudly show the veggies they picked from the garden planted

last spring by students at Wentworth Elementary. See our story on page 27. (Elizabeth Aitkens Photo)

"They have been experimenting with growing sweet potatoes in the Valley, so we thought we could give it a try here," says Brandon.

Sweet potatoes are grown from what are called a "slips", small shoots grown from the tuber that are then transplanted. They are more of a root cutting, not what one would see with a normal seed potatoe. These were planted in the spring, after the danger of frost had

passed, in plastic covered beds with drip irrigation.

The field at the end of Little Road, Glenholme looks very lush and green as the sweet potatoes are reaching maturity. Brandon says so far there haven't been any surprises and he expects to be harvesting in the next few weeks.

Digging deep into the soil, out pops a perfectly formed sweet potatoe, about six inches long with deep purple-red outer skin and an orangeypink flesh. It looks like harvesting would require a lot of hard digging but Brandon says the field will actually be harvested using a machine to lift the plants up out of the ground and then each potatoe will be picked off by hand.

The sweet potatoes will be cured in a drying room under proper humidity before moving on to store shelves. With temperature controlled storage, they expect to be able to supply the Masstown Market and Sobey's stores throughout the winter months.

J & B Millen Farms have planted a few new acres of onions and squash this year, as well. They plan to review the success of these crops over the winter months before deciding what will be on their planting list for next year.
