





## 250th Anniversary of Onslow Island Cemetery

No one seems sure exactly why a cemetery might have been established out on an island but in 1763 at a Township of Onslow Meeting it was voted, "That the East side of the Island in the Upper Marsh be a lone and sequestered for a burying place." (Israel Longworth, Truro c.1880).

On Sept. 7th, friends and supporters of Onslow Island Cemetery gathered to celebrate the 250th Anniversary, with the unveiling of a Commemorative Monument.

The cemetery roads have changed over the years, many of the earliest grave markers are gone but the significance of one of the oldest burying grounds in Nova Scotia remains steadfast, with strong ancestral connections, prompting a large turnout for the 250th Anniversary.

Eleanor Norrie, Vice President of the Onslow Cemetery Company assisted with promotion of the event and was very pleased with attendance. She and her husband, Rod Norrie, son of former NS Senator Margaret Norrie visited the Norrie family plot with grandson Nathan. Nine year old Nathan was able to visit the grave site of several ancestors, beginning with his great grandmother Margaret and great grandfather James Paul.

Rev. Gerry Kerr, of Trinity United Church, opened the Anniversary Service with a prayer with Jim Lorraine acting as Master of Ceremonies.

Jim lives in the family homestead built in 1791, not far from Onslow Cemetery where his relatives, including his father Ed Lorraine, are buried. He found some historical records in the home and noted in 1880's workers on the farm were paid \$8/month or 25 cents a day, 50 cents/day if they brought their own horse. Beef was sold for 3 cents/pound.

Several dignitaries, including District 8 Councilor Ron Cavanaugh, MLA Karen Casey and MP Scott Armstrong offered their congratulations and words of appreciation to the Trustees. Bruce Curry and Allison (Allie) Groves assisted with the unveiling of the Commemorative Monument, designed by Stone Mason Heather Lawson.

Mr. Groves began digging graves in the cemetery at the age of 14, continuing for 64 years until his 'retirement' in 2009. "There have been lots of changes over the years," he notes, "When I started at age 14, I used a pick and shovel
