Truro to hold Special Ward 3 Election



Truro Town Council met on September 6th to announce the resignation of former Ward 3 Councillor, Juliana Barnard, and to formally recognize the vacant seat on Town Council. Council also announced the date for a Special Election to fill this vacancy.

A Special Election in Ward 3 will take place on Saturday, November 18. Only residents in Ward 3 will be eligible to vote in the Special Election or nominate a candidate.

Those interested in becoming a candidate for Ward 3 must file their nomination papers before Nomination Day, which is

October 24th. Anyone on the list of electors in the Town of Truro is eligible to be a candidate. Eligible voters in Ward 3 will receive a voter information letter by mail leading up to the Special Election.

The Special Election will

be done exclusively by e-voting and residents will be able to vote between November 9 - November 18. There will also be a number of voter kiosks located in Town during this time, where equipment will be available to residents as required. Anyone who re-

quires assistance with voting can vote at the Returning Office, by appointment.

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Program Still Available to Agriculture Sector

Nova Scotia farmers affected by this year's extreme weather events can still receive assistance under the AgriStability program, even if they did not previously enrol. AgriStability supports farmers experiencing a large decline in farm income by providing protection for income losses of more than 30 per cent.

"Nova Scotia's agricultural businesses have faced real challenges due to several extreme weather events this year. That's why we are working with the Government of Canada to help the agriculture sector," said Agriculture Minister Greg Morrow. "We are giving farmers who need income support more opportunity to get it, if their incomes have dropped sharply due to damaging rains, extreme heat, wildfires or other conditions."

Farmers who did not previously enrol in AgriStability for 2023 can now participate in the program as late participants until December 31, 2024. AgriStability is one of the business risk management programs offered under the Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership (Sustainable CAP). The program is cost-shared 60 per cent federally and 40 per cent provincially/territorially.

presented an extensive report of solid waste activities at the August meeting of Colchester Council. Due to the length of the report, it has been divided into separate stories, based on the various operations at the Kemptown site and are scattered throughout this issue. This segment covers the Education/Compliance/Program section of his report.

Waste Compliance Officer Education/Compliance/Program Management

For the reporting period of April 2023 until present, there have been 180 visits made from the standpoint of either education, compliance or program management, along with another 480+ visits for cart deliveries/replacements.

From the enforcement side, when complaints are received about solid waste being an issue on a given property, Section 14, No Accumulation of Solid Waste, is used to bring that property back into compliance. This section of the Solid Waste By-law is easier to navigate through enforcement to compliance as staff are dealing with specific properties and property owners. When dealing with illegal dumping complaints (breakdown down for this period shown below), there are many times staff are unable to determine the culprit when dealing with property owners who didn't dump the material themselves. For sites of smaller quantities, the material is sifted through and taken away to avoid further litter and dumping.

If sites are comprised of larger piles on private property, the property owner is brought in on the cleanup plan as Municipal and Provincial legislation holds property owners accountable for their property. For situations where large cleanups are required, tipping fees can be reduced or waived to help with the cleanup cost.

Here is a breakdown of the 180 visits made during this period for education, compliance and program management: Accumulation of Solid Waste/Litter: 24 in total; 14 complaints with 10 follow up visits. Location breakdown of 14 complaints: Truro and Salmon River

with 3 each; Bible Hill 2; and 1 each in Belmont, Glenholme, Harmony, Kemptown, Stewiacke and Truro Heights.

Illegal Dump: 23 in total; 13 complaints with 10 follow up visits. Location breakdown of 13 complaints: Truro 3; Pleasant Valley 2; and 1 each for Bass River, Debert, Fort Ellis, Kemptown, Londonderry, North River, Salmon River and Camden.

Collection Complaints/Issues: 53 in total. These visits are generated from calls to the Helpline or by the hauler for residential non-compliance or hauler collection issue. Also, changes in collection can result in these types of educational visits.

Waste Reduction Education Visits: 26 in total. Dropping off educational material to businesses or residences that request it. Battery Collection: 33 in total; Open Burning: 2 in total - Salmon River 1 and Tatamagouche 1.

Sharps Follow Up: 1 (Brookfield). Sharps/medical waste found in recycling with identification also found resulting in follow up. Usually, there isn't ID found for follow up visits to be done.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) contract renewal upcoming. Paper Shredding even September 16, 2023 at the RECC. October is Circular Economy month and has Waste Reduction Week, partnering with Living Earth Council - Care and repair market.
