## Angels Abound in King's Rest

## **Crafts raise money for Aids-Related Projects**

Fold a brightly coloured piece of cloth over a wooden clothespin, add shiny jewellry, paint on eyes, add wings and before long a colourful angel appears before your eyes.

Judy Starritt and her friends have been spending many vacation hours this summer at her cottage in King's Rest creating unique angels. Not that she has a passion for just any crafty creation, these angels are to help raise money for Aids-related projects in África.

África Aid Angels originated in 2000 with two volunteer groups in Ottawa and Victoria. They had attended the International AIDS conference in Durban, South Africa and visited hospitals and orphanages where children suffering from AIDS were being treated and cared for. The Canadians saw a severe lack of funding and wanted to do something in a personal way to raise funds.

The volunteers came up with the idea of making angels in exchange for a donation and to date over \$235,000 has been raised for African AIDS projects.

Judy Starritt, lives in Beaverbank, but has a summer home in King's Rest. In 2008, she stumbled upon the angels while attending a yard sale in Toronto and instantly bought nine to bring home to friends.

Judy researched the group through the African Aid Angels website and became impressed with the work they were doing. She made contact with a boutique that was selling the angels in Halifax and while on vacation in British

Columbia she visited one of the angel making groups.


Some of the angels are made to look like African Warriors and use earrings for shields. Judy's sister-in-law Sylvia (Starritt) Almas, who grew up in Bass River, had passed away in 2007 and she had over 3000 pairs of earrings. Judy was now able to put these earrings to good

In King's Rest, Judy has been joined by friends from neighbouring cottages including Sally Janes, Donna MacNeill and MacKenzie Faulkner. Twelve year old Alicia Cooke, from Bass River and her friend 13 year old Merissa MacNeill, of Aylesford, have been enjoying lending a hand with the angels, as well.

"One day Merissa and I decided to take a break from making angels and we went for a walk on the beach. We started noticing interesting beach items and came up with the idea for a beach warrior," says Alicia. "A piece of beach glass makes a good shield, a spear can be made from drift wood, sea weed for wings and a shell for the hat."

Alicia says that she really enjoys making the angels and recalls one day the group of
