Mental Health and Addiction Services and Volunteer Resources of Colchester East Hants Health Authority, have partnered with The Along the Shore Community Health Board and Great Village Association to bring a program called, Take Charge Along the Shore: A Holistic Approach to Mental Wellness, to the community. Trained community-based volunteers, along with Mental Health and Addictions staff will facilitate this program. The 5 - session program is open to all members of the community. It will provide information and teach skills related to positive mental health and wellbeing. The Take Charge program will teach participants how to improve mental wellness through: healthy eating; quality of sleep; physical exercise; recognizing & reducing stress reactions; dealing with worries, thoughts and feelings; and understanding the effects of substance use & gambling. James Baillie has been acclaimed leader of the provincial Progressive Conservative Party as a result of being the only candidate to offer to replace ex-premier and ex-MLA Rodney MacDonald. Since the close of nominations, party officials have appointed Baillie as interim party leader, replacing Karen Casey, who was chosen interim leader following MacDonald's departure from the political scene.

Murray Scott, MLA Cumberland South has announced his retirement as MLA for the area. A by-election is expected to be called by Premier Darrell Dexter for later this fall. Speculation is that James Baillie will contest the seat for the Progressive Conservatives.

In July, the School Board decided to operate school busing service in the Chignecto Family of Schools (Cumberland County) for one year. Prior to this school year, the school busing service was contracted out to a private company. As in prior years, busing service will be provided to eligible students as outlined in the CCRSB Student Transportation policy. Nova Scotia Power has reduced its request for power rate increass for 2011. In a revised application to the Nova Scotia Public Utilities and Review Board, NS Power is asking for total adjustments starting next January of 6.5% for residential customers, 8.6% for commercial classes and 11.3% for industrial classes. These proposed increases are less than those contained in an earlier application. Most of the change relates to fuel costs incurred earlier this year. The request has yet to be approved.

Springhill Institution to get \$40-million upgrade

August 17 the Honourable Peter MacKay, Minister of National Defence and Member of Parliament for Central Nova, and Scott Armstrong, Member of Parliament for Cumberland-Colchester-Musquodoboit announced Correctional Service of Canada will spend \$40 million to increase capacity within Springhill Institution. This additional capacity is part of the government's plan to help ensure that criminals serve sentences that reflect the severity

of their crimes. The announcement was made on behalf of the Honourable Vic Toews, Minister of Public Safety,

Listening to the hours this young fourteen year old girl puts into her love of sports, while still maintaining scholastic Honours in Grade Eight at Central Colchester Junior High, makes you wonder how she has time to eat and sleep.

Brooke Densmore, daughter of Shawn and Carrie Densmore, of Belmont has spent at least 14 hours a week attending basketball practices alone. On top of this she has participated in numerous exhibition games, four weekend tournaments and countless additional hours participating in Track & Field events all the way up to the Provincial Level.

In December of 2009, Brooke's basketball coach at CCJHS asked her to try out for the Thunder Selects, an Elite level basketball program. She joined 70 other hopeful athletes at a camp in Halifax and was thrilled when she was selected to play on the 2010 Under 14 High Performance Team called Thunder Selects. The team later

voted Brooke to be one of the two Team Captains.

"The Thunder Selects are a private not-for-profit program, which originated in Halifax in 1999," the team website says, "While helping our athletes increase their overall skills, we stress the importance of FUN in fundamentals and make it a priority to improve our athlete's self confidence."

Brooke says the team is like one big family, including the coaches. "Everyone is very supportive of each other and we work to improve our individual skills, while working together as a team," she says.



The Thunder Selects hosted a "Hoops for Hope" Tournament, in support of Multiple Sclerosis, in early July and Brooke was awarded the Tournament All-Star.
