This hydrophone is set apart from similar products on the market by its small size and rechargeable batteries and it can process data as it is collected, saving user time and memory. The original product, called "Big Ears", was 14 inches in diameter and the wall was one inch thick, with a total weight of about 20kg. The newly developed icListen HF has a wall thickness of only 4.5mm and is much smaller in overall dimensions. The cylinder is made of titanium to withstand pressures at depths up to 3500m.

Wood says since the product was launched in March, many units have been delivered to users and feedback has been favourable. The icListen HF is currently, or about to be, deployed in the North Sea, Bay of Biscay, Mediterranean, Cook Inlet and South Pole. The product has recently been designated for use on an Australian Research Ship and by an Italian Research Group at the University of Pisa.

About 80% of sales so far have been to users outside of Canada in Germany, France, Spain, UK, and the US, Mark adds, "We expect this trend to continue and look forward to

an upswing in sales in the next few weeks as contracts get signed."

Colchester County Bob Taylor offered his congratulations to Mark Wood and his wife Desiree Stockermans (who is also the companies' Operations Manager) and said, "There are plenty of bright minds around Nova Scotia and in particular this area. We should be supporting this sort of thing more often"

Ocean Sonics is currently looking to hire three new people- in marketing, software development and technical fields. They have space for up to 12 new employees, if the need arises.

Five Tips to Observe When Around Water

As the temperature continues to rise, more and more Canadians will find relief from the heat through water-related activities like swimming and boating. In fact, it is estimated that over 90 per cent of families with young children will be in the water at some point this summer season.

Unfortunately, trips to the beach and pool can lead to tragic and avoidable water-related injuries and deaths. So to help you and your family stay safe here are five tips to keep in mind when you are around water this summer:

1) Active adult supervision Drowning is one of the leading causes of unintentional death for Canadian children ages one to four. Whether it's a pool, the bathtub, a water park, or the beach, always watch children actively around water-even if they can swim.

2) Ensure backyard pools are used safely A small child can disappear in seconds and can drown in only a few centimetres of water - enough to cover the mouth and nose. Ensure adequate barriers are in place such as four-sided fencing along with a self-closing, self-latching gate. Also ensure portable backyard pools are used safely and emptied when not in use.

3) Never leave a child unattended in a bathtub Small children are the most vulnerable group for near drownings. For every death, there are an estimated four to five near-drowning incidents, which require hospitalization and often result in varying degrees of brain damage. When a child is in the bathtub, never leave to answer the phone or for any other momentary distraction.

4) Be careful when diving Diving headfirst into water should be avoided unless the individual is properly trained and is sure the water is deep enough.

5) When in open water be aware of currents Never underestimate the power of currents. Swimmers or waders can be swept away in an instant, particularly if non-swimmers or weak swimmers get caught by currents in rivers or out of their depth in abrupt drop-offs.
