A Source for Free Digital TV

The following are some details for receiving free digital TV

Recently CBC TV has stopped transmitting analog signal as the networks are switching over to digital transmission. This affects people that have been relying on rabbit ears for a TV signal. The digital signal is being transmitted from the Halifax location and does not have a great range.

Shaw Direct has a program that will be of great interest to anyone that has been relying on rabbit ears. They have a service where they will provide a free digital receiver, a free satellite dish, free installation, and no monthly fees to

receive the free digital TV signal. To get this service, a person needs to call Shaw Direct at 1-888-782-7608 and tell them that you want to sign up for the free digital TV as you live in a area that cannot receive the digital signal. They will take your information and send a form to fill out and send back. After this they will send out a digital receiver. When you receive the digital receiver, call them back at which time they will schedule the installation of the satellite

Anytime a offer of free service is presented, there are always grounds for suspicion as most things in life are not really free. I have not been able to get a very clear answer

to this question, but it does have to do with Shaw Direct and their licensing agreements with the CRTC.

This free service is a limited until Nov 30, 2012.

From 11 a.m. to noontime, the social hour consisted of a tour of the Museum presented by Courtney Gilbert, a student summer Museum inter-She explained Parrsboro has a landscape showing different geological periods (Jurassic and Carboniferous) with plant, amphibian, fish, reptile, and dinosaur fossils. The dinosaur fossils are the oldest found in Canada and are from a Prosavopod Dinosaur called Plateosaurus who was a 200 million year old herbivore. Courtney Gilbert said, "The Museum has taught me an appreciation of the local area and all that we have to offer. I am attending Mount Allison University to become an English and Earth Sciences teacher. Working at the Museum and studying geology has helped me understand the human impact upon the Earth. People need to understand the Earth as more than just land, but as a biological diverse, ever changing habitat that we can't take for granted anymore." President Shultz thanked Gilbert for her excellent tour.

After a wonderful noon meal, President Shultz announced the singing of "O Canada," followed by the saying of the Senior Citizens Prayer, and a minute of silence for those members who have passed away since the last meeting: Inez Finley (Oxford), Brown (Springhill), Eileen Black (Northport), and Cecilia Parker (Amherst). Sharon Rector from Parrsboro won the prize of the large basket which had tickets for sale from which one ticket won in a raffle.


