ship to request that they significantly increase their support to the branch. Since 1996, there has been a pattern of weak financial results for the Bass River Branch

The significant reduction in prime lending rates starting in 2008 impelled the Board to further review the financial results for the Bass River branch. The Board advised the membership by letter in the fall of 2010 that the hours of business of the Bass River branch would be reduced in an effort to mitigate the operating loss experienced in 2009 and 2010, The Board provided a financial overview of the Bass River branch at the Annual General Meeting held in April, 2011.

In the fall of 2011, the Board completed further analysis. The Board confirmed that losses at the Bass River Branch were increasing and that closure was the viable option. The Bass River members were subsequently advised of the Board decision to close the Branch on Sept. 30.

At a meeting of members in April 2012, the Board again provided a summary of the financial performance of the Bass River branch confirming the losses.

Financial reports for the Credit Union are audited annually by its external auditors PriceWaterhouse-Coopers, who are appointed by the membership annually at the Annual General Meeting of the Credit Union. The audited Financial Statements have been presented and approved at each annual meeting.
