October, 2007 (Vol. 11, No. 10) - No issue

December, 2007 (Vol. 11, No. 11) - Donna produces paper from northern Alberta. MLA Karen Casey presents \$12,000 cheque to Londonderry Community Center. Ground broken for Garden of Sorrows at Veterans Memorial Park in Bass River. Audrey Fields of Londonderry donates cult to Great Village & District Fire Brigade Auxiliary for raffle.

2008

January, 2008 (Vol. 12, No 1) - Janet Harrington, of Glenholme, returns from 6 month civilian work term in Afghanistan. Meteorologist Cindy Day visits Family Literacy Day in Great Village. Community of Great Village declares Dec. 31st as Martha Graham Day as she celebrates 102nd birthday. Canadian Forces rescue helicopter makes emergency landing at Petro Canada, Glenholme. Helen and Fred McMaster celebrate their 70th Wedding Anniversary.
February, 2008 (Vol. 12, No 2) - Maurice & Dorothy Rees purchase The Shoreline Journal from Donna Benoit, who had moved out West. In their first issue distribute copy to every home in the area (3,900 copies). They also added two free issues to each subscription to offset missed issues prior to their purchase. Debert Business Park is declared as the "Jewel" of West Colchester as deliberations continue to transfer ownership to CoRDA and County of Colchester. Maurice starts his editorial column, Rees' Pieces.
March, 2008 (Vol 12, No 3) - 4-H member Caitlan Congdon chosen as one of five Canadian 4-H'ers to attend conference in Washington, DC. Great Village community orchard taking place as 250 apple trees are made available for adoption. Colchester Historical Society forms committee to investigate the 60 years of influence Dutch Immigrants had on Canada from 1948-1970. First edition of Dorothy's monthly column, Dorothy's Kitchen Korner. She invites residents to submit recipes for publication. WCCS students in Bass River go "pink" before going on March break.
April, 2008 (Vol 12, No 4) - Karen Casey, MLA delivers two cheques totaling \$45,000 to Veteran's Memorial Park, Bass River as part of \$90,000 development project. Laura Brenton, 11 year old Chiganois Elementary student wins to airfare tickets for two people to anywhere in North America from the Terry Fox Foundation. Linda Harrington writes detailed account of the immigration of the van den Hoek families from Holland and settling on the shore. They are best known for That Dutchman's Cheese Farm in Economy and Lowland Gardens in Great Village.
