



2019 Wilson's Scholarship Recipients BIO's

Wilson's: *Haley is an absolute asset to the company and is always willing to help out with what little free time she has. I know she will succeed in anything she aspires to be.*




Ethan Larkin




Raine Prime



Improving Security an Important Step

Colchester Councillors were complimentary about the progress being made at the Fundy Discovery Site, but want to see additional operational improvements. Their concerns centered around three areas: washrooms, condition of the entry roadway and security.

With regard to the washrooms there was concern they close when staff leaves the Information Centre in late afternoon, while there are still a large number of visitors over the supper hour and up until dusk. Staff informed council, consideration had been given to "patching" the roadway, but upon further review the staff

recommendation will be to repave.

Councillors felt getting a handle on improved security against possible vandalism to the playground; washrooms and other improvements at the site would help prevent other potential problems. With the input from CAO, Rob Simonds, staff will develop a plan and report back to council. Councillors were of the mindset, a commissioner on-site would be the best bet to handle potential situations from when summer staff finish for the day until dusk and longer periods when staff were not present at the information centre on weekends or holidays.

Women in Construction to Receive Assistance

Over \$2.5-million in funding has been announced for the Nova Scotia Apprenticeship Agency for its Advancing Women in Apprenticeship project. As part of this project, 40 women will benefit from increased awareness of the skilled trades as a first-choice career for women, employer-specific training, and support to find and retain employment in well-paying, high demand construction trades.

Participants will include women from diverse communities, including African Nova Scotians, Indigenous people and newcomers. This is an At-

lantic-wide project funded through the Women in Construction Fund, which supports projects building on existing models that have proven to be effective in attracting women to the construction trades.

These include mentoring, coaching and tailored supports that help women to progress through their training and find jobs. The Nova Scotia Apprenticeship Agency is managing the project on behalf of the Atlantic Apprenticeship Council, which is made up of the four Atlantic Apprenticeship authorities.
