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their workforce housing initiative, Crossroads Cycle has committed to renting five three-bedroom units at market rates for their employees.

In addition to addressing housing gaps, the project is expected to boost the local economy by creating construction jobs and supporting small businesses through increased demand for goods and services. The site is also designed to accommodate future expansion.

"After three years of dedication and planning, the Sunset Community is thrilled to announce the official start of construction on Sunrise Landing, an inclusive new housing community located in the heart of Pugwash," Sunset Community CEO Julie Hoeg said. "Sunrise Landing will offer a thoughtfully designed mix of affordable and market-

rate rental units to support a vibrant and diverse rural community. This new development will include one and three-

bedroom homes built to welcome individuals and families of all backgrounds.

"This milestone was reached thanks to the support and collaboration of key community partners, including the local builder Crossroads, and our funding partners. Sunrise Landing represents more than just housing—it's a place to call home, grow community, and build a brighter, more inclusive future in rural Nova Scotia."

The Sunset Community currently serves 60 people with physical and intellectual disabilities and mental illness in its residential centre, while operating an independent living support program that supports 20 people across Cumberland County in their own homes and an eight-bed group home in Pugwash.

It also operates Sunset Industries, which provides work

and skill-building opportunities to 40 people from Cumberland and Colchester counties.

Houghtaling said Sunset Landing is an example of a community coming together to make a 'pie in the sky' dream a reality.

"It will be an example of social inclusion, gorgeous sunsets and a new way of life for so many people here in the village," Houghtaling said. "Three years ago, it began with news of transformative change for the Sunset community. Pugwash has been a warm and welcoming place for our Sunset residents for 130 years and our team wanted to keep that option available and find a more inclusive way of life in the community."

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sumed thereby reducing the draw on all three systems and preserving the resource." CAO Greg Herrett said.

The Utility is requesting that customers on all three systems in Springhill, Parrsboro and Pugwash reduce or eliminate lawn, garden, plant watering or other outside water usage and RV, car or other vehicle washing at home.

Other measures residents can take to help conserve water include: Repair leaking plumbing fixtures; Take shorter showers; Minimize toilet flushing; Install low flow shower heads and appli-

ances; Wash only full loads of laundry and dishes and Turn off the water while brushing teeth.

"Utility staff will continue to monitor supply and consumption for all three systems. While further, mandatory, measures may become necessary if either of these measures move in a significantly unfavorable direction, it's hoped that we can get through this dry period without major inconvenience to our customers. We thank everyone for their patience and cooperation", Herrett said.

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Nova Scotia Sent Firefighters to New Brunswick

While continuing to fight small fires at home, Nova Scotia on August 12th sent a crew to help New Brunswick, which had several wildfires are burning out of control.

"Our neighbours in New Brunswick gave us tremendous support during the large wildfires in 2023 and we want to help them in their time of need," said Tory Rushton, Minister of Natural Resources. "Al-

though we're sending crews out almost every day to fight small fires around Nova Scotia, we are able to spare one crew for our neighbours. It's the right thing to do."

Twenty firefighters and a representative from the Department are being assigned to the Irishtown fire near Moncton. Their deployment will be for two weeks unless they are needed back in Nova Scotia

sooner.

Although Nova Scotia is facing extreme wildfire risk due to hot, dry conditions, the Province's wildfire resources can be shared at this time. The Department will continue to monitor conditions and make sure sufficient resources are maintained in the province. The crew could return within hours if needed at home.

Wood for Construction, Heating Being Promoted

The Province is making wood construction and heating a priority in public buildings. All departments have been directed to look for every opportunity to use mass timber, wood pellets, biomass, biofuels and other products made with wood that is leftover from sustainable harvesting and sawmilling.

"Now more than ever, we want to use local products for building and heating in Nova Scotia," said Public Works Minister Fred Tilley. "That's why government is leading by example and using more wood products in our own buildings. It's one of many steps our government is taking to make Nova Scotia more self-reliant and energy secure and to grow our economy and create jobs through innovation in our forestry sector."

Departments will prioritize wood products in new construction, renovations and conversions from oil heat. They will also make it a priority where applicable in projects that are partially or completely funded by the government.

This focus on using wood products aligns with the Nova Scotia Loyal program, reduces reliance on imports and enhances export markets. It will support the province's forestry sector, reduce greenhouse gas emissions and help the province move to a low-carbon economy.
